The **Regular Meeting** was called to order by Chairman Rose at 7:30 p.m., in the County Board Room located in the Administration Building. Roll call was taken.

#### CITIZEN COMMENTS

Barb Wisnefski, 2617 136<sup>th</sup> Ave., thanked the committees that already passed the resolution supporting the governor's 5% increase in medical assistance, community aides and other long term care funding. For years the state government has under funded the needs for the long term care. Approximately 98% of nursing homes in this state lose money every year on medical assistance patients. We have a crisis coming, but we can alleviate a lot of it by getting the state's support to increase the funding for long term care, community aids, home health, home care and for nursing homes. She asked for the boards support.

Earl Hawley, 39422 Bloomfield Rd., spoke regarding long term care. It's not just nursing home care, or nursing care, it's the basic hands on care that many of our elderly receive. The workers are terribly under funded with no benefit packages, because of this there are no applicants for these jobs. They are struggling to maintain their current employees. It is imperative to find some relief from this in the near future. He asked for support of the resolution tonight and to pass it on to the Counties Association.

Connie Matter, 1005 Prairie Ridge Blvd., Director of Hospice Alliance in Pleasant Prairie. She is a member of the Long Term Care Work Force Alliance and is representing the home health and the hospice community. They are requesting the board's support for the proposed 5% increase in community aids to stabilize their long term care workforce. The quality and integrity of the workforce is their concern. Our most vulnerable elderly, disabled and dying patients are entitled to quality and trained workers. With the current wage of the personal care workers, they cannot attract the workforce which they desire. The work is not easy and the demands are great.

# ANNOUNCEMENTS OF THE CHAIRMAN

Chairman Rose asked the Legislative Committee to look at the financing of a proposed rail system between here and Milwaukee. Sales tax, TIF District or the combination of both as well as other things will be reviewed and a recommendation will be made to the County Board by the Legislative Committee. He encouraged the board to attend the Legislative Committee meeting when that issue is on their agenda.

Chairman Rose announced that next Tuesday at 7:30 there will be a Committee of the Whole meeting. The Corporation Counsel will present their opinion on the issue of the size of the County Board.

#### SUPERVISOR REPORTS

Supervisor Elverman stated the Administration Committee will be looking into the staffing and employee complaints in the City/County Joint Services on the  $8^{\rm th}$  of January. He also asked that Resolution 75 on tonight's agenda be removed and placed on the January  $16^{\rm th}$  agenda.

Supervisor Faraone spoke regarding the video taping of the County Board meetings and asked that Kenn Yance give an update on the progress.

Kenn Yance stated he has been looking into this with Carthage College and met with Dr. Campbell and the head of the Fine Arts Department Leonard Schultz. Everything is pretty much set up, they're trying to get it so the students that will be doing this will get credits. It still has to go through one of their board meetings in approximately two weeks. They should know by the end of the month if they will or will not be able to get something going.

Supervisor Rossow stated that the Human Services, at the request of Chairman Rose, has studied the request of the Unite Here Group. A visit was made to Superior Health Linens plant by staff and committee members of Brookside and Human Services Board. The Human Services Committee recommends that the process of the contract procedure be allowed to proceed as usual. She also stated that the Shalom Center gave a report to the Human Services Committee. In response to their consultants recommendation they are downsizing their proposal from four million to between two and one half to three million, from thirty-eight thousand square feet to approximately twenty-two thousand square feet. They still anticipate using the KAC site with these modifications. They will start their campaign this spring with a twelve month time frame and the construction to take another twelve months. They will give more detailed report at the February meeting.

#### SUPERVISOR REPORTS

Supervisor Singer reported the Chairman of the Building and Grounds met with the Executive Director of Kemper Center, along with Fred Patrie to discuss which projects need to be done. The next Building and Grounds meeting will be held at Kemper Center with the Kemper Center Board. He also stated the conceptual plans for the 911 center will be presented at a joint meeting tentatively scheduled January  $30^{\rm th}$  at the Kenosha County Center. He invites the board to attend.

Supervisor Carbone thanked the board for the plant, phone calls and cards he received during his convalescence. He thanked his committee members who kept him informed and brought the budget forward. It was the first budget he missed in 18 years. He also stated according to County Board policy, the Finance Committee was polled and it was agreed to withdraw Resolution 79 regarding Daimler Chrysler notes. In the event Daimler Chrysler does announce that it favors Kenosha County for the new engine plant the resolution will be brought back to the county board.

Supervisor Carbone reported the general fund balance is conservatively estimated to have a modest decline in total available. This decline was planned and approved by the board as part of the 2007 budget. Even with the estimated decline, it is expected the general fund will exceed the board's adopted general fund requirements which is about 9 million dollars.

Supervisor Noble stated the Highway and Parks Committee was asked to do a traffic volume study for consideration of a four way stop at Hwy H and Bain Station Rd. It was decided that it did not qualify for a four way stop, but signs, "traffic on Hwy H does not stop" have been installed below the stop signs on Bain Station Rd. in both directions. Intersection warning signs have been installed on Hwy H. This will be reviewed periodically. He also stated golf rates for 2007 will be set at the February  $5^{\rm th}$  meeting.

Supervisor Elverman stated the Administration Committee was asked to look into the issue of the lack of employees at Joint Services. The County doesn't manage that union so there is nothing the Administration Committee can do, but the County Board could voice an opinion as a partner. He also reported on the non-rep pay plan reviews. The first group of 25 employees where reviewed, 22 received the step increase, 2 where already at the top of their level and 1 review had not come in yet. He will update the board month by month so they know how the plan is going.

Supervisor Faraone stated the finance committee recommended funds be released to the county clerk to pay for the video taping of the county board meetings.

#### RESOLUTION 84

84. From Judiciary & Law and Finance Committees regarding the Wisconsin Supreme Court's 2007-09 budget proposal contains a provision to consolidate and revised the formula of the Circuit Court Support and Guardian ad Litem payment programs into the "Circuit Court Services Support" program which will require that 75% of the court support services surcharge revenues collected by counties in the previous calendar year be appropriated for payment in the next fiscal year, resulting in additional revenue to Kenosha County.

WHEREAS, Section 753.19 of the Wisconsin Statutes mandates that, "The cost of the operation of the circuit court for each county, except for salaries of judges and court reporters provided to be paid by the state, and except for the cost assumed by the state under this chapter and chs. 40 and 230, and except as otherwise provided, shall be paid by the county;" and

WHEREAS, in the 1993-95 state biennial a budget the circuit court support and guardian ad litem payment programs were created to offset county costs related to circuit court operations; and

WHEREAS, a court support services surcharge was created to fund these payments to county government; and

WHEREAS, in state fiscal year 2005-06, \$47.1 millions was raised in court support services surcharge revenue; and

WHEREAS, counties reported allowable court costs under the circuit court support payment program of \$132,219,159; and

WHEREAS, counties received only \$18,739.600 in reimbursement under the circuit court support payment program; and

 $\mbox{WHEREAS,}$  in 2005, counties reported \$9,299,913 in guardian ad litem costs; and

WHEREAS, counties received \$4,738,500 in guardian ad litem reimbursement, the same reimbursement level since the program began in 1994; and

 $\mbox{\it WHEREAS}$ , it is the desire of county governments across the state to maintain a working partnership with the state to ensure the court system operates fairly and efficiently; and

**WHEREAS,** the focus of the Supreme Court's 2007-08 budget submission to the Governor is "partnerships with counties and other justice stakeholders;" and

WHEREAS, the Supreme Court's budget proposal contains the following elements:

> The consolidation and formula revision of the circuit court support and guardian ad litem payments program called the "Circuit Court Services Support" program; support increased funding for the new program by requiring that 75% of the court

support services surcharge revenues collected by counties in the previous calendar year be appropriated for payments under the new program in the next full fiscal year.

- A statutory change to allow for auditing of county court financial information; support the creation of an auditor position to institute a standardized program fro the recording, reporting, and auditing of county circuit court costs and revenues
- A statutory change and accompanying county reimbursement funding to require that interpreters be appointed in all case regardless of indigency; support additional funds to cover increased interpreter costs under current law related to projected increased use of interpreters and additional certified interpreters.
- > Funding to implement an ongoing court safety training program for judges, court commissioners, court reporters, clerks of circuit court staff, and other court and non-court employees located in county courthouses.
- > That the \$1 of the justice information system surcharge revenues currently deposited to the general fund be deposited to the Circuit Courts Automation Program (CCAP) to provide funding for the development of an e-filing system for circuit court case types.
- > The creation of a justice initiatives coordinator position and associated funding to implement and sustain the numerous recommendations made by the PPAC; and

WHEREAS, the Supreme Court's budget proposal will increase funding to counties by over \$12.5 million annually; and

 $\mbox{\it WHEREAS}$  , the Supreme Court's proposal appropriately shifts a portion of the funding for the state court system from the property tax to court user fees.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Kenosha County fully offers its support for the budget submission of the Supreme Court for the 2007-09 biennium; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT** Kenosha County requests that Governor Jim Doyle offer this funding proposal in his budget submitted to the Wisconsin State Legislature; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that a copy of this resolution be sent to Governor Jim Doyle, Department of Administration Secretary Stephen Bablitch, Chief Justice Shirley Abrahamson, all area legislators and the Wisconsin Counties Association.

WHEREAS, the Kenosha County Board of Supervisors believes that regular, meaningful public involvement is important to the planning process; and

WHEREAS, the Public Participation Plan developed by the Multi-Jurisdictional Comprehensive Planning Advisory Committee includes written procedures to foster public participation, ensure wide distribution of draft plan materials, provide opportunities for written comments on such materials, and provide mechanisms to respond to such comments; and

WHEREAS, the Public Participation Plan was reviewed and approved by the Multi-Jurisdictional Comprehensive Planning Advisory Committee on November 28, 2006.

#### CITIZEN COMMENTS

Carol Fischer 1033 29<sup>th</sup> Ave., Town of Somers Chairperson, spoke regarding Somers Market Center. It will be one of the premier shopping centers in all of Southeastern Wisconsin. The center will bring in about 1.2 million dollars in tax revenue to Kenosha County. Approximately 650,000 dollars will go to Unified Schools, roughly 250,000 dollars will go to the general county fund and around 200,000 dollars will go to the Utility District and the Town of Somers general fund. That doesn't count the sales tax revenue that will come from this shopping center. They have worked extensively with landscape architects and this will be one of the most heavily landscaped shopping centers in all of Southeastern Wisconsin. They put great amount of expense and time into this project and it's not about one anchor store, but about the future of the Town, the future of the County and it will be a benefit to all of us.

Matthew Sinnen, 3190 100<sup>th</sup> Avenue, Somers spoke against the proposed rezoning for the Somers Market Place LLC. He does not understand how this proposed rezone of the site in question can move forward without the approval and consent of the Department of Natural Resources. Item no. 9 of the conditional use permit states the developer can not turn ground until the letter is received which either approves or denies mitigation. He asked the board to table the developers request for rezone until Dr. John D. Richards' letter is submitted to the Department of Natural Resources.

Adrienne Roach, Mukwanago, was just hired to the Wisconsin League of Conservation Voters in the Kenosha-Racine area. She would like to someday move to a place that has some sort of environmental value. She does not think it would be harmful to wait and see what the environmental survey has to offer.

Leah Blough,  $8355\ 57^{\text{th}}$  Avenue, spoke against the rezoning that Somers Market LLC has applied for. It has come to her attention that this development is Wal-Mart. There are many small business in the City of Kenosha that are going to be in direct competition with Wal-Mart for products and services.

Jill Sopa, Town of Paris voiced some concerns regarding the environment, water supply and air quality of the Town of Paris because of Waste Management and their proposed landfill expansion. For this landfill expansion, a variance has been placed on her private well without her consent and recorded on her deed. Waste Management has applied with the DNR for approval of RD&D which is adding other liquids or sludges that come off of the landfill. Right now 75% of the garbage comes from Illinois. She has found out if the expansion is granted, the line of waste will be as close as 350 feet away from a private houses and private wells.

# CHAIRMAN ANNOUNCEMENTS

Chairman Rose stated that Gordon West,  $23^{\rm rd}$  District Supervisor has submitted his resignation as the county's representative on the Kemper Center Board of Directors and in his place Chairman Rose appointed Judy Rossow,  $2^{\rm nd}$  District Supervisor, she has agreed to serve on the board.

#### SUPERVISOR REPORTS

Supervisor Elverman stated this evening the board will be voting on the Labor Agreement for Local 1392. He also stated that even though the current system has saved us numerous dollars it is prudent to put out RFP for the Health Care. The responses will be due August  $1^{\rm st}$  and they will have something for the County Board to look at in April.

Supervisor Breunig stated over the last two months they have received some donations for the Pringle Nature Center which includes a \$500 donation from American Express Company, Fortune Brands in Deerfield, IL has given a \$400 donation and the Town of Bristol has budgeted an annual donation of \$1500.

Supervisor Molinaro stated he calls Mr. Melcher almost monthly to get an update on where the landfill process is at. He keeps hearing that they're talking about modifications to what their original plan was, and bringing in some additional material that they intend to spread over the landfill etc. He asks through the chair if there could be more of an effort to put some sort of pressure on the Town of Paris to keep the board up to speed on what they're doing.

Supervisor Ekornaas stated up until recently the expansion matter has been lying in limbo and was just told by Mr. Melcher that there has been a renewed effort to get together with Paris and Waste Management.

Supervisor Noble reported the current bike path which will link up to Parkside is still on schedule and will be bid out in May with construction to begin this year. He also stated they are applying for a hazardous elimination project for the intersection of Hwys Y and A. A local road improvement project on Hwy S, from Hwy N to almost Hwy 31 will be done this summer. The DOT is doing a rehab project on the three bridges on Hwy 50 between Hwys 31 & H this summer which means from mid June to mid August Hwy 50 will be down to one lane in both directions. Alternate routes will be posted. Hwy 32, from 16<sup>th</sup> Street to 9<sup>th</sup> Street will be scheduled for rebuilding this year. Pets is open for golf, Brighton Dale is planned to open on Friday.

The **Regular Meeting** was called to order by Chairman Rose at 7:30 p.m., in the County Board Room located in the Administration Building. Roll call was taken.

## CHAIRMAN ANNOUNCEMENTS

Chairman Rose stated there is a notice on the desks of a public hearing from the Wisconsin Legislature, the Committee on Health and Human Services regarding a publicly financed health care system for Wisconsin residents. He also spoke regarding the WCA Conference at the Dells on October  $7^{\rm th}$  thru the  $9^{\rm th}$  and asked by the show of hands who was interested in attending.

## SUPERVISOR REPORTS

Supervisor Singer reported the gas, electric and water cost at the Brookside west building is about \$48,500. The painting project at the Public Safety Building has been completed. The carpet project at the PSB will start at the end of the month. The last remaining roof tops at the Job Center will be replaced at the end of the month. The facilities division has experienced numerous problems with some of the hot water systems at the Detention Center. They are looking into how to efficiently and reliably replace the system. There will be a resolution for an emergency replacement of a 60 ton air conditioner compressor unit for the PSB. Documents are being prepared for the Ambrose Hall roof at the Kemper Center. There is an Ordinance for the parking structure being prepared to bring everything up to date.

Supervisor Ekornaas stated as a result of the Somers Market Place debate at the last county board meeting, he explained how the zoning petitions come to the board for action. They have a highly trained professional staff to review, investigate, negotiate and prepare recommendations. Supervisor Ekornaas will not ask the staff to appear before the board on routine matters handled by the Land Use Committee. However, if he believes a project has elements that should be explained to the full board by staff, they will be at the county board meeting. If a supervisor would like a member of the staff to appear before the board, they can make the request to Supervisor Ekornaas. Supervisors that have a particular interest in a project should attend both Land Use meetings so they can be as informed on a project as the committee is.

Supervisor Rossow reported the Shalom Center has reduced the size of their project, they are moving forward with the Inns Program and Food Pantry at the site next to Kenosha Achievement Center. There will be Alderman, Supervisor and neighborhood meetings.

Supervisor Elverman reported from the Administration Committee there is a report available for vacation cash out procedures for Kenosha County Employees. A report on Health Benefits is also available and will be going to Finance Committee this week. There was also a report on the non-rep pay plan, there were 19 evaluations, 5 sworn personal which are not included with the step increases, 5 at the top, and 9 who received step increases.

Supervisor Marrelli stated nomination forms for the Youth in Governance are ready and are going out to teachers, counselors and principals. Applications are ready for interested students. Due date for the applications is July 1<sup>st</sup>. July and August they will be interviewing and training. If any board member is interested in being a mentor, they can let the Extension office know. One of the sessions at WCA will be about Youth in Governance, hopefully Kenosha will be a part of it.

#### RESOLUTION 120

- 1. Develop a policy for notifying other investigative agencies, including law enforcement officials in appropriate cases.
- 2. Establish an abuse reporting system to carry out the purposes of  $\rm s.46.90$  Wis. Stats. and  $\rm s.55.043$  Wis. Stats.
- 3. Enter into a memorandum of understanding regarding the operation of the system with the county department under s.46.215 or 46.22 and with any private or public agency, including a county department under s.51.42 or 51.437, within the county that is participating in the reporting system. The memorandum of understanding shall, at a minimum, identify the agencies that are responsible for the investigation of reports of abuse, financial exploitation, neglect, or self-neglect of elder adults at risk and adults at risk, as well as for the provision of specific direct services.
- 4. Receive reports of abuse, financial exploitation, neglect, or self-neglect of elder adults at risk and adults at risk.
- 5. Publicize the existence of the reporting system in the county and provide a publicized telephone number that can be used by persons wishing to report suspected cases of abuse, financial exploitation, neglect, or self-neglect. Also, provide a telephone number that can be used to make reports after the agency's regular business hours.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Kenosha County Board of Supervisors do hereby designate the Kenosha County Department of Human Services as Kenosha County's "Elder Adult-at-Risk Agency" pursuant to Chapter 46 of the Wisconsin Statutes, and the "Adult-at-Risk Agency" pursuant to Chapter 55 of the Wisconsin Statutes. # ORDINANCE 1

1. From Building & Grounds and Judiciary and Law Committees regarding Amending Section 7.03(3) of the Municipal Code of Kenosha County regarding the Civic Center Designated Parking Areas.

The Kenosha County Board of Supervisors does hereby ordain that section 7.03 (3) of the Municipal Code of Kenosha County be, and hereby is, amended to read as follows:

- (3) Parking Restricted -- Civic Center Designated Parking Areas. (3/19/85) (05/15/07)
  - (a) No owner or operator of any vehicle shall park, or stop, or leave standing such vehicle, or suffer, or allow, or permit such vehicle to be parked or left standing in any of the following Kenosha County Civic Center parking areas, designated as Lots 1 through 7, unless pursuant to the provisions of this section:
  - - No person other than the individual or class that has been assigned a designated parking space shall park in that designated space.
    - Parking spaces reserved for individual's vehicles will be 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, with no exclusion for weekends and holidays.
    - 3. Parking slots reserved for law enforcement vehicles and county supervisor's vehicles will be 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, with no exclusion for weekends or holidays.
    - 4. Lot 1 shall be reserved for not more than thirty minutes, short term public, non-employee parking.
    - 5. The County Parking Ramp and outer parking lot #2 is reserved for general non designated Kenosha County employees, safety building employees, and members of the general public conducting business with the County. In addition a set number of designated 24 hour paid spaces will be reserved for Metra riders who must display their reservation tag at all times.
    - 6. Parking Lot 3 shall be reserved at all times for Kenosha County Safety Building employees who are properly displaying an Official County issued parking permit.
    - 7. Lot 4 shall be reserved exclusively and at all times for designated Kenosha County Sheriff, City of Kenosha Police, and City/County Joint Services vehicles and designated officials who are properly displaying Official County issued parking permits.
    - 8. Lot 5 shall be reserved for individuals on Kenosha County Jury duty who have been issued a juror's pass which is properly displayed on their vehicle.
    - 9. Lot 6 shall be reserved for elected officials and designated employees of the Kenosha County Administration Building who are properly displaying Official County issued parking permits.
    - 10. Lot 7 shall be reserved for designated Kenosha County employees or officials who are properly displaying Official County issued parking permits.
    - 11. Lot 8 shall be reserved at all times for Kenosha County Sheriff police squads and transport vehicles.
    - 12. Aisle parking, parking in posted "No Parking" areas, parking across two designated parking spaces with one vehicle and pedestrian mall parking shall be prohibited.
    - 13. Vehicles occupying the handicapped reserved spots in the County Parking Ramp must display the "disabled" rear view window tag or have appropriate license
    - 14. The county building custodian shall see that all park ing lots referred to in this section are properly

posted with signs in accordance with this ordinance of sufficient size to be readable by a person with average eyesight.

15. Enforcement of this section will be the responsibility of the County Sheriff's Department or under cooperative agreement with other governmental agencies through the issuance of a citation under section 3.60 of this Code entitled Uniform Citation Ordinance.

WHEREAS, WI OJA is not requiring a match for this award, therefore no additional tax levy dollars are requested to initiate the program.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Kenosha County Board of Supervisors accept the grant and approve the revenue and expenditure line items be modified, as per the attached budget modification forms, which are incorporated herein by reference.

WHEREAS, from February through April 2007, the amount of inmates being transported and housed in the Kenosha Sheriff's Detention System rose significantly as a result of a new agreement with the US Marshall's in Milwaukee along with BICE increasing their numbers from 98 inmates a day to over 200 a day, and

WHEREAS, the complexity and burden of the everyday workload of these responsibilities has caused the 2 supervisors assigned to work an average 10 to 13 hours a day to ensure timely and accurate compliance, and

WHEREAS, to provide necessary supervision to relieve the burden of the Conveyance Bureau, which is now in a critical situation, the Sheriff's Administration must strip current supervision from Patrol and Investigations, which then creates a serious situation in those particular areas, and

WHEREAS, this critical situation necessitates the Sheriff to add one (1) Sworn Sergeant FTE beginning in June 2007 increasing the authorized strength from 11 to 12 Sworn Sergeant FTE's, and

WHEREAS, the cost of the added mid year promotion to Sergeant will be 7% above the top Deputy Sheriff rate of pay, and

**WHEREAS**, the cost of the mid year replacement for Deputy Sheriff will be \$29,852.33 funded by the 2007 unanticipated federal inmate revenue, and

WHEREAS, if the funding source mentioned does not materialize or is otherwise dissolved, the one Sworn Sergeant position will be terminated via attrition and the Sheriff's authorized Sworn Sergeant FTE's strength will return to 11.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Kenosha County Board of Supervisors approve the revenue and expenditure budget modifications affecting budget year 2007, as per the attached budget modification form, which is incorporated herein by reference.

WHEREAS, as a result of this regulation to immediately cease FFP for medical benefits, all costs of medical care must be borne solely by counties.

 ${\bf NOW,\ THEREFORE,\ BE\ IT\ RESOLVED}$  by the Kenosha County Board of Supervisors that this Board:

- 1. Urges the U.S. Congress and the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to amend federal law to allow federal financial participation in providing medical benefits to incarcerated individuals until convicted and sentenced to secure detention.
- 2. Directs the Clerk of the Board to transmit a certified copy of this resolution to the members of our Congressional Delegation and the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services
- 3. Directs the County's federal lobbyists to advocate for the passage of the legislation and/or rule change set forth in paragraph 1. above, and directs the Office of Intergovernmental Affairs to include this item in the 2007 Federal Legislative Package.

## CITIZEN COMMENTS

Bill Morris, Town of Somers Administrator, spoke regarding Somers Market Center. This project has taken the Town of Somers; it's staff, elected officials and the Bradford Corporation over 2 ½ years to get to this point. Somers Market Center will have a 40% green space requirement. There is a Developers Agreement which is a recordable document, and which will be transferred with the property and it's owners. There is also a significant maintenance agreement to insure this stays a crowned jewel. He asks and appreciates the boards support.

James Smith, Town of Somers Chairman, spoke regarding Somers Market Center. This project will be looked at as a blueprint of how large development should be and can be brought forth. Everything was considered with rigid restrictions to make sure that care of the neighborhood and surrounding area will be taken care of. Hopefully with the boards approval, this development will set the future pace for Somers Township which has been needed for a long time

Todd Battle from the Kenosha Area Business Alliance (KABA), spoke regarding the commuter rail. He wanted the board to know that KABA did put a resolution of support on this issue. There are about fifty thousand daily commuters coming in and out of the county for work. ### RESOLUTION 11

11. From Terry Rose, Finance, Legislative and Highway & Parks Committees a Resolution in support of the Extension of Commuter Rail Service from Kenosha to Racine and Milwaukee.

WHEREAS, the Counties and Cities of Milwaukee, Racine, and Kenosha in cooperation with the Wisconsin Department of Transportation have agreed to sponsor a Transit Alternatives Analysis Corridor Study and Draft Environmental Impact Study for enhanced public transit service generally east of I-94 in the Counties of Kenosha, Racine and Milwaukee (KRM); and

WHEREAS, the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission (SEWRPC), by an intergovernmental agreement, has agreed to serve as project manager for the purpose of managing the Transit Alternatives Analysis/Draft Environmental Impact Statement (AA/DEIS); and

WHEREAS, the KRM project purpose and need is to provide high quality transit service connecting Kenosha, Racine, and Milwaukee Counties with each other and with northeastern Illinois, thereby improving access to jobs and labor force, encouraging high density mixed use and more efficient land development around stations, and attracting increased transit ridership, potentially reducing highway traffic volumes and congestion and attendant air pollutant emissions; and

WHEREAS, the Transit AA/DEIS has now been completed and has identified commuter rail as the best alternative for providing improved transportation service and mobility, land use development and redevelopment benefits, and environmental benefits, and as the KRM Commuter Link project, has been recommended to be advanced to implementation as the locally preferred alternative; and

WHEREAS, the Transit AA/DEIS includes preliminary station area development plans for the Kenosha County commuter rail stations in the City of Kenosha and Town of Somers which have been developed and included as part of the KRM Commuter Link Transit Supportive Land-Use Plans and Policies Portfolio; and

WHEREAS, the Transit AA/DEIS includes a financial plan for the proposed commuter rail service which identifies the funding source for the local share

of the commuter rail service costs as recommended by the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Transit Authority (RTA), and which consists of an increase in the RTA car rental fees to \$15 per transaction; and

WHEREAS, SEWRPC must meet the requirements of the Federal Transit Administration's (FTA) New Starts program by submitting a Request to Initiate Preliminary Engineering to advance to the next phase of implementation and be eligible for discretionary capital funding; and

WHEREAS, Kenosha County has reviewed the findings and conclusions of the AA/DEIS including its financial plan and preliminary transit supportive land use plans and policies;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS, OF KENOSHA COUNTY, WISCONSIN, AS FOLLOWS:

Section One. Kenosha County will benefit from the proposed commuter rail service connecting Kenosha, Milwaukee, and Racine Counties with each other and with northeastern Illinois and also from the transit oriented development around its proposed commuter rail stations.

**Section Two.** Kenosha County therefore endorses and supports the development implementation, and operation of commuter rail service as the locally preferred alternative for providing the best means for expanded and improved transit service in the Kenosha-Racine-Milwaukee (KRM) corridor.

Section Three. Kenosha County endorses and supports the recommendation of the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Transit Authority (RTA) to increase the RTA fee on car rentals to \$15 per transaction to in order to fund the local share of costs for the proposed KRM commuter rail service; and encourages the RTA to provide further recommendations relative to dedicated and permanent funding sources for all public transit services in Kenosha, Milwaukee, and Racine counties.

Section Four. The City of Kenosha and Town of Somers station area plane developed as part of the AA/DEIS and included in the Transit Supportive Land-Use Plans and Policies Portfolio, are hereby found to be consistent with the goals and objectives of land use and comprehensive plans for Kenosha County.

Section Five. Kenosha County endorses the station area plans and policies and will take appropriate steps toward implementation as recommended as part of the Transit Supportive Land-Use Plans and Policies Portfolio if commuter rail is chosen for implementation.

**Section Six.** Kenosha County endorses and supports the submission of a Request to Initiate Preliminary Engineering for the KRM Commuter Link project to the FTA New Starts program, towards development and implementation of commuter rail service in the KRM corridor.

**Section Seven.** Kenosha County urges FTA approval of the Request to Initiate Preliminary Engineering for the KRM Commuter Link project, and acceptance and endorsement of the complete KRM Commuter Link Transit Supportive Land-Use Plans and Policies Portfolio.

## CITIZEN COMMENTS

Sheriff Dave Beth asked the board for their support of Resolution 44 which is on tonight's agenda. It is very crucial they get these ten officers to keep the revenue coming in. The Sheriff's Department has brought in more federal inmates than they had anticipated. A week and a half ago, Sheriff Beth declared an emergency in the pre-trial facility. If the resolution is adopted, the ten correctional officers would be brought in steps to get the sheriff's department closer to the point they need to be, in order to open up the new 118 bed facility in the beginning of 2008 so they can continue the revenue process.

Mark Conforti, president of the Kenosha County Deputy Sheriff's Association stated they are here to support the sheriff in his request for ten additional correctional officers. Currently their members are working a significant amount of overtime. It is his understanding that the overtime situation in the jail has reached a critical stage and is in need of immediate attention. He appreciates the boards time to listen to their comments and hopes they support the sheriff with his request.

#### CHAIRMAN ANNOUNCEMENTS

Chairman Rose welcomed Supervisor Carbone back from his absence and asked Supervisor Carbone to say a few words.

Supervisor Carbone thanked members of the board who sent notes wishing him a speedy recovery. He also thanked everyone who visited him while at Brookside, especially Supervisor Ron Johnson who visited him every week, and Supervisor Faraone and her sister Laurie who visited him a couple times a week and always brought him a strawberry shake. He attested to the fact that Brookside is an outstanding facility.

Chairman Rose stated the board received a very thoughtful note from Mrs. Fabiano. If anyone would like to read it they can do so after the meeting.

### SUPERVISOR REPORTS

Supervisor Singer reported there was a mandatory walk through for the hot water replacement system at the Kenosha County Detention Center. The resurfacing of the Molinaro parking lot also had a mandatory walk through. They may delay that project until after the Jensen trial because of the amount of media that is expected. There will be a re-bidding for the Ambrose roof replacement because they only received one bid. Brookside floor replacement is proceeding wing by wing. The unemployment building is being reviewed by staff and an independent architect for the possibility to use it as a 911 dispatch center. The Piasecki Funeral Home is being reviewed to see if it could be used for the medical examiner. The ball diamonds and soccer fields will be ready for play in 2008. The job center roof replacement is complete and phase two of the duct work will commence in August. The grease pit vault at Brookside has been completed.

Supervisor Carbone stated that Chairman Rose has been selected to the Board of Directors of the Supreme Court. He also reported that the State Surveyors were at Brookside and had nothing but praise for Brookside and designated their program as one of the best in Wisconsin.

Supervisor Clark stated that there was a newspaper article that reported Kenosha County had one of the higher tax rate increases in the state. He feels they worked hard getting the levy in line. The average increase over the last

three years in all municipalities in Kenosha County was  $3\frac{1}{2}$ % Kenosha Unified School District's average was at 6.91%. The County's last three year average has been 2.95%. He feels they have done a good job on the County Board and looks forward to holding the line in the future.

WHEREAS, to relieve the frequency and quantity of overtime assignments, and to prepare for the staffing of the KCDC expansion, the Sheriff needs to add an additional ten (10) Correction/Direct Supervision Officer FTE's beginning in the fall of 2007 increasing the authorized strength of CO's and DSO's from 133 to 143, and

WHEREAS, the cost of the added staff including uniforms will be \$116,884 funded with anticipated surplus of federal housing revenue for 2007, and

### CITIZEN COMMENTS

Joyce Erickson, 7802-38th Ave., Kenosha. Spoke in support of State Senate Bill 150, known as the "Breathe Free Wisconsin Act", currently pending in the Legislature. Of the smokers surveyed, over 80% want to quit but it is an addiction. It is a financial issue as well as a public health issue. In the City of Appleton, 100% Smoking Ban had been implemented two years ago and the overall number of licensed establishments increased from 112 to 122 in 2007 and there were no bar closures. This indicates people stay in their local community and do not "drive to smoke".

David Stevens, 8111 Sheridan Road, a senior at Tremper High School asked the County Board to support State Senate Bill 150 and make Kenosha a safe place to breath.

Chaz Bartucz,  $212B-55^{\text{th}}$  Street, chairman of The Kenosha Tobacco Free Coalition. He wanted to thank the committees that supported Senate Bill 150. Illinois will be going smoke free next year and Minnesota this fall. 22 states are smoke free.

Mike Brey, Executive Director of Kemper Center wanted to share with the board the 2007 Beautification Award received from the Kenosha Area Chamber of Commerce.

#### RESOLUTION 48

48. From Legislative Committee The State of Indiana for Permitting Grievous harm to Lake Michigan.

WHEREAS, the state of Indiana Governor has signed a permit allowing British Petroleum Corporation's Whiting refinery to increase dumping of their waste into Lake Michigan by 1,584 pounds of ammonia and 4,925 pounds of sludge per day. This has been done with out the consideration of neighboring states and municipalities.

WHEREAS, Kenosha County gets a large percentage of their drinking water from Lake Michigan and known carcinogens are carried in these suspended solids. Increased amounts of ammonia have known effects on fish population production.

WHEREAS, Kenosha County has invested heavily in the improvement of our Lake front and boating industry. This increased dumping by BP, just 80 miles from our fishing and boating waters, creates hazards to the economic future of this industry.

WHEREAS, the ecological stress put upon Lake Michigan with lower Lake levels totaling 17inches coupled with invasive species problems and increased applications for water diversions puts our Lake in a precarious environmentally delicate situation. No added stress is needed.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Kenosha County Board of Supervisors do hereby condemn the dumping by British Petroleum's Whiting refinery in the state of Indiana into Lake Michigan as undesirable for the health and water quality of the surrounding shoreline states, village's, towns and cities. We hereby censure the allowance of such a permit as grievous harm to our economic future and the future health of our citizenry.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Kenosha County Board of Supervisors asks that a meeting of Southeastern Wisconsin Mayors, County Executives, Legislators and the Governor of Wisconsin be held in support of our resolution as quickly as possible to prevent further pollution from occurring.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Kenosha County Board also requests a copy of this resolution be sent to every Federal Congressperson and Senator from the State of Wisconsin and those states bordering Lake Michigan the State of Indiana Governor.

# RESOLUTION 57

57. From Legislative Committee regarding Opposition to 2007 Assembly Bill 438.

WHEREAS, 2007 Assembly Bill 438 creates a nine-member task force to study the responsibilities and obligations of county government and to develop a plan to reduce the number of counties in this state from 72 to 18 or fewer, and

WHEREAS, 2007 Assembly Bill 438 requires that the task force's proposal regarding a reduction in the number of counties be prepared by 2011, and

WHEREAS, the suggestion of 18 counties or fewer is an arbitrary number that lacks substantiated research to support the proposition that Wisconsin citizens would be better served by 18 counties or fewer, and

WHEREAS, numerous commissions and task forces such as the Kettl Commission have devoted a great deal of time, energy, and resources to the state and local government partnership and the delivery of services, and

WHEREAS, the Kettl Commission provided a substantive and innovative report with numerous worth-while recommendations regarding local government service delivery and efficiencies that were never considered by state Legislature, and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin citizens would be better served by a discussion relating to local government issues in their entirety, rather than creating a committee charged with attempting to implement a subjective reduction in the number of Wisconsin counties, and

WHEREAS, the state/local government partnership, how local government services are provided and funded, and Wisconsin's taxation structure and system are issues that should be discussed before state policy makers arbitrarily modify the number of Wisconsin counties, and

WHEREAS, any examination of the number of counties and structure of county government in Wisconsin should consider the current and future social and economic trends, current and future demographics and the examination should consider a practical and lasting solution that serves Wisconsin citizens for generations to come, and

 ${\tt WHEREAS}$ , numerous issues have to be considered and implemented for the reduction of counties to occur, and

WHEREAS, issues that must be resolved include but are not limited to: existing labor contracts between a respective county and its labor unions, real estate documentation such as deeds and plats, zoning authority and land use issues, human service contracts and services, general contracts between a respective county and services provider, and more, and

WHEREAS, the initial costs of transforming form 72 counties to 18 counties or fewer would be substantial to Wisconsin taxpayers, and

WHEREAS, the costs borne to taxpayers to implement such a reduction in counties would come at a time when the state of Wisconsin has continuous structural budget deficits and other pressing issues such as an aging population and an antiquated taxation system.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Kenosha County Board of Supervisors opposes 2007 Assembly Bill 438.

### RESOLUTION 60

60. From the Finance Committee a Resolution for Cancellation of Tax Certificates, Interest and Penalties under Sec. 75.105, to Remediate Pollution under Rules of Wis. DNR.

WHEREAS, A growing urban problem exists when toxic substances are released into the soil and environment and the persons responsible abandon the land, while the polluted real estate endangers health and safety of the community; many such sites remain in disrepair and unused, mortgage companies often avoid taking ownership upon default due to the potentially high cost of remediation, resulting in unpaid taxes, lower property values and blight; Limited governmental resources for cleanup are allocated to the very worst sites; and

WHEREAS, The State of Wisconsin created a law to encourage private environmental remediation and restoration of polluted parcels; Section 75.105 allows counties, in their discretion, to forgive real estate taxes, interest & penalties related to tax certificates taken on such parcels, where the owner has entered into a written agreement with the Wisconsin DNR to remediate such sites under DNR rules and supervision; and

WHEREAS, Kenosha County has been asked, pursuant to s. 75.105, to cancel tax certificates on 3 parcels of real estate constituting an abandoned strip mall located on approximately 3.5 acres of land at 2103-2133 91<sup>st</sup> Street, at the corner of 22<sup>nd</sup> Avenue in Pleasant Prairie, WI, by the new owner, BFU II, LLC, who took over for M&I Bank in foreclosure and who plans to raze and clean up the site and then build a small residential condominium development; and BFU II,LLC has offered to deposit a letter of credit in the amount of taxes forgiven with Kenosha County to guaranty to faithful completion of such environmental remediation; and

WHEREAS, The Wis. DNR has entered into an agreement with BFU II, LLC dated May 18, 2007, for the owner to investigate and clean up such property by restoring the environment to the extent practicable under DNR rules and supervision, upon a finding that such land is contaminated by a hazardous substance and conditioned upon Kenosha County forgiving the unpaid property taxes for which a tax certificate has been issued, plus interest and penalties on those taxes; and

WHEREAS tax certificates have been issued in 2004, 2005 and 2006 on such parcels numbered 93-4-123-183-0350, -- 0400 and --0402 by the Kenosha County Treasurer, and taxes plus penalties and interest are owed under such certificates in the amount of approximately \$27,930, which amount continues to accrue; and upon advice of counsel the Treasurer is reluctant to take a tax deed on such land and thereby subject Kenosha County to the liability for environmental pollution and costs of remediation.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, That the County Board of Supervisors hereby approves the cancellation of tax certificates issued in 2004, 2005 and 2006, and the forgiveness of taxes, interest and penalties related to those tax certificates, on the real estate located at 2103-2133 91st Street, Pleasant Prairie, WI, known as Tax Parcel Numbers 93-4-123-183-0350, 93-4-123-183-0400 and 93-4-123-183-0402, and authorizes the Kenosha County Treasurer to discharge same, upon the condition that BFU II, LLC deposits a letter of credit, in the

amount of taxes, interest and penalties hereby forgiven, with Kenosha County to guaranty to faithful completion of such environmental remediation and restoration of such land to productive use within three years of the date of this resolution, unless such time is extended upon a finding of good cause in writing signed by both the County Executive and the County Treasurer. This resolution covers taxes represented by such tax certificates and does not affect special assessments or municipal special charges or other taxes or liens upon such property.

WHEREAS, in June 2007 the Kenosha County Division of Child Support notified the Sheriff that federal funding used to fund the non-support enforcement efforts of the Sheriff's Special Investigative Unit (SIU) will be significantly reduced beginning October 2007, and

WHEREAS, the Special Investigative Unit had been contracted by the Kenosha County Division of Child Support for enforcement tasks associated with non-support offenses to ensure that noncustodial parents meet their obligation to financially support their children, and

 ${\tt WHEREAS}$ , this unit consisted of three (3) Detectives and one (1) Senior Office Associate, and

WHEREAS, this unit has been in operation for 30 years and had been partially funded at 66% of its operating costs from the federal government through the local Child Support Agency as incentive for state and local agencies to effectively deal with non-support cases, and

WHEREAS, the federal government through the 2005 Deficit Reduction Act will reduce their financial support which in effect causes our local Child Support Agency to terminate its Memorandum of Understanding with the Sheriff's Department for its Special Investigative Unit effective September 30, 2007 and find alternate less costly ways to affect non-support cases, and

WHEREAS, per the 2007 Budget Policy Resolution #1, passed November 14, 2006, when grant funding ends that supports personnel, the positions must be terminated unless an alternate non-levy funding source is found, and

WHEREAS, it has been determined that many of the tasks that the SIU division performed regarding noncustodial non-support cases will continue to be required of the Sheriff's Department, and

WHEREAS, the Sheriff wishes to maintain these positions through year end 2007 at a cost of \$90,556 for which alternate funding sources are necessary to attain the 66% support of the personnel costs, and

WHEREAS, the Sheriff will terminate the grant funded .40 FTE DA Investigator position currently in the District Attorney's budget effective September 30, 2007 so that the balance of this non-levy funding source be redirected to the Sheriff's Department in order that the Sheriff be able to assign a Detective formally of the SIU division to assume these drug unit investigative duties for the remainder of 2007, and

**WHEREAS,** the alternate funding necessary to bridge the gap for the  $4^{\rm th}$  quarter of 2007 will be \$59,767 and will come from Federal Inmate Housing surplus and Kenosha County Controlled Substance Unit program income, and

WHEREAS, the Sheriff has a plan to retain these personnel that will be proposed in the upcoming 2008 budget hearings.

WHEREAS, KABA has asked the County to contribute \$1,000,000 to KABA which will be used by KABA to provide a grant to Chrysler to ensure an adequate power supply for the Project, which assurance will serve as inducement to Chrysler to construct and operate the Project; and

WHEREAS, it is the finding of the County Board that the construction and operation of such a facility would create significant new job opportunities in the County, would enhance the County's tax base and would directly and indirectly promote the general welfare of the residents of the County and that the County's contribution of funds to KABA to facilitate that purpose is a public purpose within the meaning of Section 67.04(1)(b) of the Wisconsin Statutes.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the County Board of Supervisors of Kenosha County, Wisconsin that there may be issued, pursuant to Section 67.12(12), Wisconsin Statutes, General Obligation Promissory Notes in an amount not to exceed \$1,000,000 for the public purpose of making a contribution to KABA to be used to assist in providing an adequate power supply for the Project

as an inducement to Chrysler to construct and operate the Project. There be and there hereby is levied on all the taxable property in the County a direct, annual tax in such years and in such amounts as are sufficient to pay when due the principal and interest on such Notes.

### RESOLUTION 71

71. From Finance Committee regarding Providing for the Sale of Not to Exceed \$4,050,000 General Obligation Promissory Notes.

WHEREAS, on June 21, 2005, the County Board of Supervisors of Kenosha County, Wisconsin (the "County"), by a vote of more than three-quarters of the members-elect, adopted a resolution entitled "Initial Resolution Authorizing the Borrowing of Not to Exceed \$20,000,000; Providing for the Issuance and Sale of General Obligation Securities Therefor; and Authorizing the Borrowing of Not to Exceed \$56,300,000; Providing for the Issuance and Sale of General Obligation Refunding Securities Therefor; and Levying a Tax in Connection Therewith" (the "2005 Initial Resolution") authorizing, among other things, the issuance of general obligation promissory notes in an amount not to exceed \$20,000,000 for public purposes, including paying the cost of constructing, extending, repairing and improving streets, roads and bridges; improvement and maintenance projects at various County buildings and sites; constructing and equipping a law enforcement and dispatch center; implementing the survey monumentation program; upgrades to the communications systems; and acquiring vehicles, equipment, furnishings, fixtures and land; and

WHEREAS, on December 21, 2006, the County issued its \$2,150,000 General Obligation Promissory Notes, Series 2006, to finance capital projects authorized by the 2005 Initial Resolution; and

WHEREAS, on October 2, 2007 the County Board, by a vote of more than three-quarters of the members-elect, adopted a resolution entitled "Initial Resolution Authorizing the Issuance of General Obligation Promissory Notes in an Amount Not to Exceed \$1,000,000 for Kenosha Area Business Alliance Project" (the "2007 Initial Resolution") for the public purpose of making a contribution to the Kenosha Area Business Alliance ("KABA") to be used to ensure an adequate power supply to the existing Kenosha Engine Plant (the "Plant") operated by DaimlerChrysler ("Chrysler") as an inducement for Chrysler to make substantial improvements to the production lines and buildings at the Plant (the "KABA/Chrysler Project"); and

WHEREAS, the County Board of Supervisors hereby finds and determines that the projects authorized by the 2005 Initial Resolution and the 2007 Initial Resolution are within the County's power to undertake and therefore serve a "public purpose" as that term is defined in Section 67.04(1)(b) of the Wisconsin Statutes; and

WHEREAS, counties are authorized by the provisions of Section 67.12(12) of the Wisconsin Statutes to borrow money and to issue general obligation promissory notes for such purposes; and,

WHEREAS, the County Board of Supervisors of the County hereby finds and determines that general obligation promissory notes in an amount not to exceed \$3,050,000 for purposes authorized in the 2005 Initial Resolution and general

obligation promissory in an amount not to exceed \$1,000,000 for the purpose authorized in the 2007 Initial Resolution should be issued, and it is now necessary and desirable to authorize their sale.

 ${\bf NOW}, \ {\bf THEREFORE}, \ {\bf BE} \ {\bf IT} \ {\bf RESOLVED}$  by the County Board of Supervisors of the County that:

Section 1. Authorization of the Notes. For the purpose of paying costs of the projects authorized by the 2005 Initial Resolution and the 2007 Initial Resolution, there shall be borrowed pursuant to Section 67.12(12) of the Wisconsin Statutes, a principal amount not to exceed Four Million Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$4,050,000\$) from a purchaser to be determined by competitive sale (the "Purchaser").

Section 2. Sale of the Notes. To evidence such indebtedness, the Chairperson and County Clerk are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to make, execute, issue and sell to the Purchaser for, on behalf of and in the name of the County, general obligation promissory notes aggregating a principal amount not to exceed Four Million Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$4,050,000) (the "Notes"). The County shall offer the Notes for public sale at a subsequent meeting of the County Board.

Section 3. Notices of Sale. The County Clerk (in consultation with the County's financial advisor, Ehlers & Associates, Inc.) shall cause a Notice of Sale to be prepared and distributed and may prepare or cause to be prepared an Official Statement or other form of offering circular setting forth the details of the Notes.

Section 4. Award of the Notes. Following receipt of bids for the Notes, the County Board of Supervisors shall consider taking further action to provide the details of the Notes and to award the Notes to the lowest responsible bidder therefor.

 $\underline{\text{Section 5.}}$  Further Authorizations. The County Executive and the other officers of the County are authorized to execute any documents or agreements related to or required to carry out the transactions contemplated by the KABA/Chrysler Project.

Section 6. Reimbursement. The County declares its reasonable expectation to reimburse itself from the proceeds of the Notes for expenditures relating to the KABA/Chrysler Project which it pays from the Treasurer's cash account prior to receipt of the proceeds of the Notes no more than 60 days prior to the date this Resolution is adopted. The County may also reimburse itself for preliminary expenditures relating to the KABA/Chrysler Project (such as architectural, engineering, surveying, soil testing, costs of issuance and similar costs but not including land acquisition, site preparation and similar costs incident to the commencement of construction) which are in an amount which is less than 20% of the issue price of the Notes. This declaration and the Resolution of which it is a part, shall be publicly available in the official books, records or proceedings of the County Board.

Section 7. Conflicting Resolutions; Severability; Effective Date. All prior resolutions, rules or other actions of the County Board of Supervisors or any parts thereof in conflict with the provisions hereof shall be, and the same are, hereby rescinded insofar as the same may so conflict. In the event that any one or more provisions hereof shall for any reason be held to be illegal or invalid, such illegality or invalidity shall not affect any other provisions hereof. The foregoing shall take effect immediately upon adoption and approval in the manner provided by law.

WHEREAS, after public meeting and due consideration, the Kenosha County Finance Committee has recommended that KABA seek approval from the EDA to permanently increase the maximum individual loan limit size for the EDA/RLF from \$400,000\$ to \$800,000, and

**WHEREAS**, it is necessary for the Kenosha County Board of Supervisors to approve the preparation and submission of a request to the EDA seeking approval to permanently increase the maximum individual loan limit size for the EDA/RLF from \$400,000\$ to \$800,000, and

WHEREAS, the Kenosha County Board of Supervisors has reviewed the need for the proposed increase and the benefits to be gained therefrom.

WHEREAS, the 2006 County Budget Resolution (Policy Resolution #2) stated that the Medical Examiner remodeling project be review by the Building and Grounds and Finance Committees, and that a final plan be approved by the County Board, and

WHEREAS, on January 30th 2007, a preliminary site location and office layout plan as presented to the Joint Committees of Building & Grounds, Judiciary & Law, Finance, Human Services, and Land Use, and

WHEREAS, the 2007 Resolution of Statement of Need and Authorization to Proceed (Resolution #114) authorized that an additional \$150,000 be authorized to be spent to provide additional planning dollars bringing the total authorized to be spent to \$250,000 of the original \$1,100,000 and designed a need to continue with the planning and development of a new office location at the property currently owned by Kenosha County commonly referred to as 45/50 and

WHEREAS, the total expenditures for said project are \$368,620 that include \$2,400 for the tower analysis by Graef Anhalt & Schloemer, \$18,894 for the site survey by R A Smith & Associates, \$9,520 for the soil analysis by Terracon Consultants, \$43,121 for schematic design by Zimmerman Design Group, \$129,365 for design development by Zimmerman Design Group, and \$6,712 for additional expenses incurred by Zimmerman Design Group (attached is expenditure detail).

**NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED,** that based upon the total expenses incurred to date for the planning and development of a new office location at the property currently owned by Kenosha County commonly referred to as 45/50, an additional \$150,000 be authorized to fund additional planning services, bringing the total authorized funds for said services to \$400,000.

Kenosha County Reiterates its support for the Kenosha to Racine, to Milwaukee commuter rail project.

Kenosha County reiterates its support for the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Transit Authority (RTA) recommendation to increase the RTA fee on car rentals to \$15.00 per transaction in order to fund the local share of the costs.

Kenosha County respectfully submits that the Office of the Governor and the Wisconsin Legislature receive this Resolution and immediately take up the issue of KRM funding either in special session or as the first possible agenda item of the next Legislative session.

WHEREAS, Pursuant to Section 65.90 of the Wisconsin Statutes, Kenosha County is a public body having the power to levy a general property tax and has the responsibility of formulating an annual budget and holding public hearings thereon; and

and holding public hearings thereon; and WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 59.17 of the Wisconsin Statutes, the County Executive is charged with the responsibility of annually submitting a proposed budget to the County Board; and

WHEREAS, the Executive's budget has been referred to the Finance Committee, and the Finance Committee has met and added its recommendations; and

WHEREAS, public notices were issued and public hearings were held in accordance with Wisconsin Statutes, Section 65.90; and

WHEREAS, certain accounts, accounting procedures, and fees have been revised in the 2008 budge are herein incorporated into the budget; and

WHEREAS, Section 59.52(6)(c) of the Wisconsin Statutes permits the County Board to direct the County Clerk to sell property on such terms as the County Board approves; and

WHEREAS, the Summary of Budgeted Personnel Changes has been incorporated as part of the 2008 budget; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to County Executive Appointment 2007/08-20 (which is attached and incorporated by reference), the County Executive has appointed LaVerne Jaros to serve as the Kenosha County Director of the Division of Aging and Disability Services per County Board Resolution 32 which established said positions; and

WHEREAS, subject to review and approval of the Human Services Committee the Executive's appointment of LaVerne Jaros to serve in the position of Director of the Division of Aging and Disability Services; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to County Executive Appointment 2007/08-21 (which is attached and incorporated by reference), the County Executive has appointed David Geertsen to serve as the Kenosha County Director of Finance and Administrative Services, a new Department Head position which has been included in the 2008 budget and

WHEREAS, the Finance Committee as part of the Budget deliberations has reviewed the Executive's request and approval of the appointment of Director of Finance and Administrative Services; and

WHEREAS, the Sheriff's Department staffing of Deputies and Correctional Officers vacancies has caused recruiting, staffing, morale, and efficiency problems; and

WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin has determined that an error in the determination of equalized value (known as a palpable error) has been made and as a result of the palpable error, the State has ordered under s.74.41 that the County make payments to certain municipalities; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to provision of Section 75.22 of the Wisconsin State Statutes, the County shall charge back to the local municipalities illegal assessments and cancel the tax certificates; and

WHEREAS, certain appropriations in the 2007 and 2008 budget will be encumbered (contractually obligated, but not liquidated) at year end 2007 and 2008; and

 $\mbox{\it WHEREAS},$  the County health insurance program is self-funded, and exposed to a degree of volatility,

WHEREAS, from time to time emergency situations occur which result in immediate action by a Department or Division, and

WHEREAS, the state law requires that proceeds from debt issuance be recorded in a separate fund; and

WHEREAS, certain capital projects and capital outlay funded with bond proceeds are budgeted within Special Revenue or General Funds, however, it is the desire of the County Board to reflect these as capital projects; and

WHEREAS, it is projected that there will be unspent funds at year-end 2008; and

 $\mbox{\it WHEREAS},$  The Budget includes a county-wide vacancy adjustment of \$1,360,000 and

WHEREAS, the County Board adopted Resolution No. 8 in 1998, which phased out the Kemper Center annual subsidy; and

WHEREAS, the County Board has appropriated \$250,000 in previous levy under-spending from Human Services and designated these funds for use as a one-time grant to support construction, renovation and/or start-up costs of a community homeless shelter; and

WHEREAS, the Shalom Center and the Kenosha Achievement Center have agreed to a property transaction that provides a location acceptable to the community on which the shelter facility can be constructed; and

WHEREAS, the Shalom Center pending City approval of land use and construction plans will have initiated prior to the end of the first fiscal quarter of 2008 a capital fund raising campaign for this facility and may be expected prior to the end of the second fiscal quarter of 2008 to have raised at least 30% of the capital funding target for this facility, which percentage is the condition imposed by the County for release of the \$250,000 in appropriated funding; and

 $\mbox{\it WHEREAS}$  , as the Joint Services Board has eliminated Joint Services reserves; and

WHEREAS, effective October 1, 2007 the Federal Deficit Reduction Act had revoked the use of State Child Support Incentive funds which were used by counties to capture 66% reimbursement of Federal funds to supplement county budgets; and

WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin Bureau of Child Support has suggested a one year alternative to moderately "cushion" the impact of the loss of Federal funds and has provided early access to Kenosha County's 2008 Incentive Funds through a contract amendment dated October, 2007; and

WHEREAS, the 2008 Child Support Incentive funds received in 2007 will increase State revenue and allow Department of Human Services to carry forward to the 2008 budget the same amount of levy to match the "early" incentive funds received under the State/County contract amendment; and

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED,** by the Kenosha County Board of Supervisors, that the County Executive's Budget of October 2, 2007, which is attached hereto and incorporated by reference, be adopted as the County Board's Budget as herein amended and a copy of said budget document as certified by the County Clerk as having been brought up for first reading on November 6<sup>th</sup>, 2007 is herewith attached; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** by the Kenosha County Board of Supervisors, that the budget for 2008 be adopted as shown in the Kenosha County Budget Summary which is attached and incorporated as part of this resolution; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that it is the policy intent, desire, and order of the County Board, that each appropriation unit of the budget's detailed pages for which money has been appropriated be carried out as if adopted by a separate resolution according to the terms and conditions as outlined in the "Establishment Of The Appropriation Unit for the 2008 Budget" which is attached and incorporated by reference; and to the extent necessary to carry out the public intent, the funds hereby appropriated are made available; and that unless provided by law, no monies appropriated for an appropriation unit are to be used for another purpose without prior approval (the Finance Committee is delegated such authority for amounts not to exceed \$1000); and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that all expenditures herein appropriated be and the same are ordered not to exceed the funded monies as detailed in the budget document without prior approval of the County Board; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that it is the policy of the County Board that the budget is authority for the departments or divisions to act as otherwise provided by law, and that administrative revisions of account identification, but not dollar totals or specific purposes, may take place during the budget year; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the sum of \$52,445,460 be apportioned to the city and the various towns and villages of Kenosha County for all purposes and expenses for 2008; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the sum of \$1,328,329 be apportioned to the towns and villages of Brighton, Bristol, Genoa City, Paris, Pleasant Prairie, Somers, and Wheatland for the purpose of library expense for 2008; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the sum of \$2,484,546 be apportioned to the city and the various towns and villages of Kenosha County for the State Forestry Tax expense for 2008; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** that the County Board does hereby authorize an appropriation to be disbursed to the applicable municipalities in this budget year for palpable errors identified by the State after adoption of this budget; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that palpable errors be appropriated in account 15130.559100 for the purpose of paying to the municipalities, in accordance with State law, as ordered by the State of Wisconsin Department Revenue; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that palpable errors in the amount of \$4,586 will be added to the property tax levy for collection in 2008 as allowed by the State of Wisconsin. Therefore, this apportionment will not affect the general fund; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the various towns and villages and the city within the County be charged for the recovery of the illegal assessments on certain parcels on which tax certificates are to be cancelled in whole or in part as shown in the following schedule; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the proceeds from anticipated debt issuance be listed in the budget for informational purposes only and that the proceeds be recorded in a note/bond issuance proceeds account within the capital projects fund after the debt is approved by the County Board and deposited in the County Treasury; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the County Clerk sell property under term and conditions establish by the County Board; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that as it is the intent of the County to develop a debt policy, until such time as a policy is adopted by the County Board, it shall be the policy of Kenosha County to require initial resolutions authorizing the issuance of debt be approved by 21 votes of the County Board; and

WHEREAS, the integrated touchscreen Master Control Security System malfunctioned in early October causing a jail security shutdown for the Public Safety Building and the PreTrial Facility, and

WHEREAS, the recommendation of our security system contractor is to consider funding a project to improve the system before a major failure occurs that could shut the security system down for weeks, and

WHEREAS, the program re-write or replacement software could cost upwards of \$100,000.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Kenosha County Board of Supervisors accept the attached budget modification , which is incorporated herein by reference, to recognize a portion of the expected surplus in Federal Inmate Housing revenue of \$743,207 and increase personnel costs, Food/Groceries and Capital budget totaling \$743,207.

# KENOSHA COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS COUNTY BOARD CHAMBERS COUNTY ADMINISTRATION BUILDING December $4^{\rm th}$ , 2007

The **Regular Meeting** was called to order by Chairman Rose at 7:30 p.m., in the County Board Room located in the Administration Building. Roll call was taken.

#### THERE WERE NO CITIZEN COMMENTS

Mary Beier, Director of Kenosha County Juvenile Intake reported on Juvenile Detention for Kenosha County Youth. Juvenile Detention is a secure environment that is a short-term court ordered placement for youth that are between the ages of 10 and 17. It is used as the last alternative. Kenosha County does not own or operate a juvenile detention facility. There are three facilities located in southeast Wisconsin. For the past ten years, Kenosha County entered into multi-year contracts with Racine County for use of their bed space. The current contract runs through December 2009, which include 18 beds that are guaranteed daily. The daily rate is \$127.00 per bed per day. The rate will increase gradually in the next two years. Without the contract the normal rate would be \$53.00 more per day. Through the first eleven months of this year, Kenosha County Juvenile Court has admitted an average of thirtytwo youth per month to detention, which is a decrease of seven youth per month from the year before. The youth that were admitted this year have each stayed on average 10.3 days or almost one day longer than last year. There is no conclusive way to predict when increases or decreases will occur.

John Jansen, Director of Kenosha County Division of Family Services spoke regarding delinquency programs in Kenosha County. Many of the programs have been in place for over twenty years and they continue to monitor their effectiveness. Kenosha County has been recognized throughout the state as a county that has been very progressive in providing services to families, and helping kids stay in their home whenever possible.

# ANNOUNCEMENTS OF THE CHAIRMAN

Chairman Rose reminded the board the Holiday Party will be on December  $18^{\rm th}$  at 6:00 p.m. at the County Center.

Chairman Rose announced that Supervisor Robert Carbone would not seek reelection. Supervisor Carbone has served some twenty years on the board of supervisors. He has served as the Chairman of this Board, and Chairman of the Finance and Judiciary and Law Committees. His leadership will be missed.

#### SUPERVISOR REPORTS

Supervisor West stated there is an open invitation to the Brookside Care Center's Christmas party on December 19<sup>th</sup>, from 2:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m.

Supervisor Marrelli stated the Extension Education had their  $90^{\rm th}$  Anniversary on May  $1^{\rm st}$ . They put together a pamphlet, which is on the supervisor's desks.

Supervisor Wisnefski reported he had the opportunity to meet with our bond rating people in Chicago. They just got the news that Kenosha County has been raised up from Aa3 to Aa2 rating.

Supervisor Noble reported a letter would be submitted expressing preliminary support of the I-94 reconstruction project at the public hearing on December 6<sup>th</sup>. The improvements include interchange reconstruction, and adding an additional lane in both directions. A resolution supporting the project will be drafted and brought before the County Board. He also reported the Technical Advisory Committee of the KRM recommended they not submit an application without a funding source in place. The committee will likely vote to suspend the application for a year which will delay the project. The Commissioner of Railroads has dismissed the petition from Union Pacific Railroad for a closure of the railroad crossings at CTH A and L in the Town of Somers. The Commissioner has ordered the crossings be upgraded by December 31, 2008. Bids for the bike trail in Somers that connects the two universities has

been received. The bids are being reviewed and will be awarded for spring construction. Traffic signals are up and working at the intersection of CTH S & H. The ball diamonds at Brighton Dale and the soccer fields at Silver Lake are completed and will be ready for play this spring and a grand opening will be announced.

Supervisor Molinaro stated it is unfortunate the Extension Education didn't do more to celebrate their successes. His experience on the Extension Committee has been nothing short of fantastic. They do an incredible amount of work on an incredibly small budget. The staff doesn't get nearly enough credit for all the work they do.

Supervisor Grady caused to have placed on the supervisor's desks a two-page enclosure entitled "What deaths fall within the Medical Examiner." During the deliberations of the County Budget, it was brought up what appears to be the increased amount of autopsies and medical exams in Kenosha County. The enclosure is a concrete document on how the autopsies are done and he thinks this is being more tightly adhered to under our current medical examiner's jurisdiction than in the past years.

#### RESOLUTION 89

89. From Legislative Committee regarding Maintaining the size of the County Board at 28 Members and to Review the Question of the Size of the Board at the Next Decennial Census in 2010.

Whereas, recent amendments to Wisconsin Statutes Sec. 59.10 (3)(cm)1 allow a County Board to decrease the number of elected Supervisors serving on the County Board and redistrict, readjust and change the boundaries of supervisory districts once between decennial census' provided that the number of districts equals the number of Supervisors, the districts are substantially equal in population according to the most recent countywide federal census, the districts are as compact as possible, and the districts consist of contiguous whole ward in existence at the time at which the redistricting plan is adopted, and to the extent possible place contiguous municipalities or contiguous parts of the same municipality are placed within the same district, and

Whereas, there is no petition pending for a referendum on the question of decreasing the number of seats on the County Board, and

Whereas, the Kenosha County Board has studied various alternatives pertaining to the size of the County Board, and

Whereas, the Kenosha County Board has determined that the decennial census and scheduled re-districting is to be reviewed in 3 years and further that any action taken at this time would have to be redone at that time, and

Whereas, the requirement of utilizing existing wards in any reduction between decennial censuses can result in larger deviations from the target population for each district which, in turn, can result in unequal representation between supervisory districts and litigation, and

Whereas, the Legislative Committee has conducted two public hearings on the size of the County Board, and whereas only three members of the public appeared and spoke on the question, and

Whereas, the Kenosha County Board, after having reviewed and discussed this matter throughly has determined that the size of the Kenosha County Board can and should at this time remain at the same and that further review take place after the 2010 census;

Now Therefore Be It Resolved that the size of the Kenosha County Board remain the same and that further review of the size of the County Board take place at the time of the 2010 census.

#### RESOLUTION 90

90. From Finance Committee the Sale of Approximately \$4,050,000, General Obligation Promissory Notes, Series 2007A; Providing the Form of the Notes; and Levying a Tax in Connection Therewith.

WHEREAS, on June 21, 2005, the County Board of Supervisors of Kenosha County, Wisconsin (the "County"), by a vote of more than three-quarters of the members-elect, adopted a resolution entitled "Initial Resolution Authorizing the Borrowing of Not to Exceed \$20,000,000; Providing for the Issuance and Sale of General Obligation Securities Therefor; and Authorizing the Borrowing of Not to Exceed \$56,300,000; Providing for the Issuance and Sale of General Obligation Refunding Securities Therefor; and Levying a Tax in Connection Therewith" (the "2005 Initial Resolution") authorizing, among other things, the issuance of general obligation promissory notes in an amount not to exceed \$20,000,000 for public purposes, including paying the cost of constructing, extending, repairing and improving streets, roads and bridges; improvement and maintenance projects at various County buildings and sites; constructing and equipping a law enforcement and dispatch center; implementing the survey monumentation program; upgrades to the communications systems; and acquiring vehicles, equipment, furnishings, fixtures and land;

WHEREAS, on December 21, 2006, the County issued its \$2,150,000 General Obligation Promissory Notes, Series 2006, to finance capital projects authorized by the 2005 Initial Resolution;

WHEREAS, on October 2, 2007 the County Board of Supervisors, by a vote of more than three-quarters of the members-elect, adopted a resolution entitled "Initial Resolution Authorizing the Issuance of General Obligation Promissory Notes in an Amount Not to Exceed \$1,000,000 for Kenosha Area Business Alliance Project" (the "2007 Initial Resolution") for the public purpose of making a contribution to the Kenosha Area Business Alliance ("KABA") to be used to ensure an adequate power supply to the existing Kenosha Engine Plant (the "Plant") operated by DaimlerChrysler ("Chrysler") as an inducement for Chrysler to make substantial improvements to the production lines and buildings at the Plant (the "KABA/Chrysler Project");

WHEREAS, the 2005 Initial Resolution and the 2007 Initial Resolution were not subject to petition for referendum;

WHEREAS, on October 2, 2007, the County Board of Supervisors of the County adopted Resolution No. 71 (the "Sale Resolution") which provided for the sale of General Obligation Promissory Notes (the "Notes") in an amount not to exceed \$4,050,000\* (\$3,050,000 for purposes authorized in the 2005 Initial Resolution and \$1,000,000 for the purpose authorized in the 2007 Initial Resolution);

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to the Sale Resolution, the County Clerk, in consultation with its financial advisor, Ehlers & Associates, Inc., has caused a Notice of Sale (a copy of which is attached hereto as  $\underline{\text{Exhibit A}}$  and incorporated herein by reference) to be prepared and distributed setting forth the details of and the bid requirements for the Notes and indicating that the Notes would be offered for public sale on December 4, 2007;

WHEREAS, the following bid proposals were received:

BIDDER NET INTEREST COST TRUE INTEREST RATE (SEE BID TABULATION ATTACHED AS EXHIBIT B)

WHEREAS, it has been determined that the bid (the "Bid") submitted by the institution listed first on the attached Bid Tabulation fully complies with the bid requirements set forth in the official Notice of Sale and is deemed to be the most advantageous to the County. A copy of said Bid submitted by such institution (the "Purchaser") is attached hereto as  $\underline{\text{Exhibit C}}$  and incorporated herein by this reference; and

WHEREAS, none of the proceeds of the Notes shall be used to fund operating expenses of the general fund of the County or to fund operating expenses of any special revenue fund of the County that is supported by property taxes;

 ${\bf NOW}, \ {\bf THEREFORE}, \ {\bf BE} \ {\bf IT} \ {\bf RESOLVED}$  by the County Board of Supervisors of the County that:

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Section 1. Approval of Offering Documents. The Notice of Sale and other offering materials prepared and circulated by Ehlers & Associates, Inc. are hereby ratified and approved.

<u>Section 2. Award of the Notes</u>. The Bid of the Purchaser offering to purchase the Notes for the sum set forth on the Bid, plus accrued interest to the date of delivery, is hereby accepted. The Notes bear interest at the rates set forth on the Bid.

Section 3. Terms of the Notes. The Notes shall be designated "General Obligation Promissory Notes, Series 2007A"; shall be dated December 20, 2007; shall be issued in the aggregate principal amount of  $\$4,050,000^*$ ; shall be in the denomination of \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof; shall be numbered 1 and upward; and shall bear interest at the rates and shall mature on December 1 of each year, in the years and principal amounts as set forth on the schedule attached hereto as  $Exhibit\ D$  and incorporated herein by reference (the "Schedule"). Interest is payable semi-annually on June 1 and December 1 of each year commencing on June 1, 2008.

Section 4. Redemption Provisions. At the option of the County, the Notes maturing on December 1, 2015 and thereafter shall be subject to redemption prior to maturity on December 1, 2014 or on any date thereafter. Said Notes shall be redeemable as a whole or in part, and if in part, from maturities selected by the County and within each maturity, by lot, at the principal amount thereof, plus accrued interest to the date of redemption. If the Proposal specifies that any of the Notes are subject to mandatory redemption, the terms of such mandatory redemption shall be set forth on an attachment hereto as  $\underline{\text{Exhibit MRP}}$  (the "Mandatory Redemption Provisions") and incorporated herein by this reference.

<u>Section 5. Form of the Notes</u>. The Notes shall be issued in registered form and shall be executed and delivered in substantially the form attached hereto as Exhibit E and incorporated herein by this reference.

Section 6. Direct Annual Irrepealable Tax Levy. For the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on the Notes as the same becomes due, the full faith, credit and resources of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged, and there is hereby levied upon all of the taxable property of the County a direct annual irrepealable tax in the years 2007 through 2016 for the payments due in the years 2008 through 2017 in the amounts set forth on the Schedule.

The direct annual irrepealable tax hereby levied shall be carried onto the tax roll and collected in addition to all other taxes and in the same manner and at the same time as other taxes of the County for said years are collected. So long as any part of the principal of or interest on the Notes remains unpaid, the tax hereinabove levied shall be and continues irrepealable except that the amount of tax carried onto the tax roll may be reduced in any year by the amount of any surplus in the Debt Service Fund Account created below.

Section 7. Segregated Debt Service Fund Account. There is hereby established in the County treasury a fund account separate and distinct from all other funds or accounts of the County designated "Debt Service Fund Account for Kenosha County General Obligation Promissory Notes, Series 2007A, dated December 20, 2007", which fund account shall be used solely for the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on the Notes. There shall be deposited in said fund account all accrued interest paid on the Notes at the time the Notes are delivered to the Purchaser, any premium, all money raised by taxation pursuant to Section 6 hereof and all other sums as may be necessary to pay principal of and interest on the Notes as the same becomes due. Said fund account shall be used for the sole purpose of paying the principal of and interest on the Notes and shall be maintained for such purpose until such indebtedness is fully paid or otherwise extinguished, and shall at all times be invested in a manner that conforms with the provisions of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"), and any applicable income tax regulations (the "Regulations").

Section 8. Borrowed Money Fund; Reimbursement. The proceeds of the Notes (the "Note Proceeds") (other than any premium and accrued interest which must be paid at the time of the delivery of the Notes into the Debt Service Fund Account created above) shall be deposited into an account separate and distinct from all other funds and disbursed solely for the purposes for which borrowed or for the payment of the principal of and the interest on the Notes.

The County declares its reasonable expectation to reimburse itself from the Note Proceeds for expenditures relating to the projects financed by the Notes which it pays from other funds of the County prior to receipt of the Note Proceeds no more than 60 days prior to the dates the 2005 Initial Resolution and the 2007 Initial Resolution were adopted. The County may also reimburse itself for preliminary expenditures relating to those projects (such as architectural, engineering, surveying, soil testing, costs of issuance and similar costs but not including land acquisition, site preparation and similar costs incident to the commencement of construction) which are in an amount which is less than 20% of the issue price of the Notes. This declaration and the Resolution of which it is a part, shall be publicly available in the official books, records or proceedings of the County Board of Supervisors.

Section 9. Arbitrage Covenant. The County shall not take any action with respect to the Note Proceeds which, if such action had been reasonably expected to have been taken, or had been deliberately and intentionally taken on the date of the delivery of and payment for the Notes (the "Closing"), would cause the Notes to be "arbitrage bonds" within the meaning of Section 148 of the Code and the Regulations.

The Note Proceeds may be temporarily invested in legal investments until needed, provided however, that the County hereby covenants and agrees that so long as the Notes remain outstanding, moneys on deposit in any fund or account created or maintained in connection with the Notes, whether such moneys were derived from the Note Proceeds or from any other source, will not be used or invested in a manner which would cause the Notes to be "arbitrage bonds" within the meaning of the Code or Regulations. The County covenants that it will not invest in any obligation if such investment would violate the "prohibited payment" requirement of Section 148 of the Code.

The County Clerk, or other officer of the County charged with responsibility for issuing the Notes, shall provide an appropriate certificate of the County, for inclusion in the transcript of proceedings, setting forth the reasonable expectations of the County regarding the amount and use of the Note Proceeds and the facts and estimates on which such expectations are based, all as of the Closing.

Section 10. Additional Tax Covenants; Small Issuer Exemption from Rebate; Qualified Tax-Exempt Obligation Status. The County hereby further covenants and agrees that it will take all necessary steps and perform all obligations required by the Code and Regulations (whether prior to or subsequent to the issuance of the Notes) to assure that the Notes are obligations described in Section 103(a) of the Code, the interest on which is excludable from gross income for federal income tax purposes, throughout their term. The County further covenants that it will not take any action, omit to take any action or permit the taking or omission of any action within its control (including, without limitation, making or permitting any use of the proceeds of the Notes) if taking, permitting or omitting to take such action would cause any of the Notes to be an arbitrage bond or a private activity bond within the meaning of the Code or would otherwise cause interest on the Notes to be included in the gross income of the recipients thereof for federal income tax purposes. The County Clerk or other officer of the County charged with the responsibility of issuing the Notes, shall provide an appropriate certificate of the County as of the Closing, for inclusion in the transcript of proceedings, certifying that it can and covenanting that it will comply with the provisions of the Code and Regulations.

Further, it is the intent of the County to take all reasonable and lawful actions to comply with any new tax laws enacted so that the Notes will continue to be obligations described in Section 103(a) of the Code, the interest on which is excludable from gross income for federal income tax purposes throughout their term.

The County covenants that it is a governmental unit with general taxing powers and that the Notes are not "private activity bonds" as defined in Section 141 of the Code.

In accordance with Section 148(f)(4)(D) of the Code, the County covenants that ninety-five percent (95%) or more of the net proceeds of the Notes are to be used for local governmental activities of the County and that the aggregate face amount of all tax-exempt obligations (other than "private activity bonds") issued by the County, including all subordinate entities of the County, during calendar year 2007 will not exceed \$5,000,000. If for any reason the County did not qualify for the small issuer exemption from the rebate requirements of the Code, the County covenants that it would take all necessary steps to comply with such requirements.

The County Board of Supervisors hereby designates the Notes to be "qualified tax-exempt obligations" pursuant to the provisions of Section 265(b)(3) of the Code and in support of such designation, the County Clerk or other officer of the County charged with the responsibility for issuing the Notes, shall provide an appropriate certificate of the County, all as of the Closing.

Section 11. Execution of the Notes. The Notes shall be issued in typewritten or printed form, executed on behalf of the County by the manual or facsimile signatures of the Chairperson and County Clerk, authenticated, if required, by its fiscal agent, if any, sealed with its official or corporate seal, if any, or a facsimile thereof, and delivered to the Purchaser upon payment to the County of the purchase price thereof, plus accrued interest to the date of delivery. In the event that either of the officers whose signatures appear on the Notes shall cease to be such officers before the delivery of the Notes, such signatures shall, nevertheless, be valid and sufficient for all purposes to the same extent as if they had remained in office until such delivery. The aforesaid officers are hereby authorized to do all acts and execute and deliver all documents as may be necessary and convenient to effectuate the Closing.

<u>Section 12. Payment of the Notes</u>. The principal of and interest on the Notes shall be paid in lawful money of the United States of America by the County Clerk or County Treasurer.

Section 12A. Persons Treated as Owners; Transfer of Notes. The County shall keep books for the registration and for the transfer of the Notes. The person in whose name any Note shall be registered shall be deemed and regarded as the absolute owner thereof for all purposes and payment of either principal or interest on any Note shall be made only to the registered owner thereof. All such payments shall be valid and effectual to satisfy and discharge the liability upon such Note to the extent of the sum or sums so paid.

Any Note may be transferred by the registered owner thereof by surrender of the Note at the office of the County Clerk, duly endorsed for the transfer or accompanied by an assignment duly executed by the registered owner or his attorney duly authorized in writing. Upon such transfer, the Chairperson and County Clerk shall execute and deliver in the name of the transferee or transferees a new Note or Notes of a like aggregate principal amount, series and maturity and the County Clerk shall record the name of each transferee in the registration book. No registration shall be made to bearer. The County Clerk shall cancel any Note surrendered for transfer.

The County shall cooperate in any such transfer, and the Chairperson and County Clerk are authorized to execute any new Note or Notes necessary to effect any such transfer.

The fifteenth day of each calendar month next preceding each interest payment date shall be the record date for the Notes. Payment of interest on the Notes on any interest payment date shall be made to the registered owners of the Notes as they appear on the registration book of the County at the close of business on the corresponding record date.

Section 13. Utilization of The Depository Trust Company Book-Entry-Only System. In order to make the Notes eligible for the services provided by The Depository Trust Company, New York, New York ("DTC"), the County agrees to the applicable provisions set forth in the Blanket Issuer Letter of Representations previously executed on behalf of the County and on file in the County Clerk's office.

Section 14. Payment of Issuance Expenses. The County authorizes the Purchaser to forward the amount of the Note Proceeds allocable to the payment of issuance expenses to U.S. Trust Company, Minneapolis, Minnesota on the closing date for further distribution as directed by the County's financial advisor, Ehlers & Associates, Inc.

Section 15. Official Statement. The County Board of Supervisors hereby approves the Preliminary Official Statement with respect to the Notes and deems the Preliminary Official Statement as "final" for purposes of SEC Rule 15c2-12. All actions taken by officers of the County in connection with the preparation of such Preliminary Official Statement and addenda to it are hereby ratified and approved. In connection with the closing for the Notes, the appropriate County official shall certify the Preliminary Official Statement and addenda. The County Clerk shall cause copies of the Preliminary Official Statement and addenda to be distributed to the Purchaser.

Section 16. Undertaking to Provide Continuing Disclosure. The County hereby covenants and agrees, for the benefit of the holders of the Notes, to enter into a written undertaking (the "Undertaking") required by SEC Rule 15c2-12 promulgated by the Securities and Exchange Commission pursuant to the Securities and Exchange Act of 1934 (the "Rule") to provide continuing disclosure of certain financial information and operating data and timely notices of the occurrence of certain events in accordance with the Rule. The Undertaking shall be enforceable by the holders of the Notes or by the Purchaser on behalf of such holders (provided that the rights of the holders and the Purchaser to enforce the Undertaking shall be limited to a right to obtain specific performance of the obligations thereunder and any failure by the County to comply with the provisions of the Undertaking shall not be an event of default with respect to the Notes).

The County Clerk, or other officer of the County charged with the responsibility for issuing the Notes, shall provide a Continuing Disclosure Certificate for inclusion in the transcript of proceedings, setting forth the details and terms of the County's Undertaking.

Section 17. Bond Insurance. The Chairperson and County Clerk are authorized to agree to such additional provisions as any municipal bond insurer which makes a commitment accepted by the County to insure the Notes may reasonably request and which are acceptable to the Chairperson and County Clerk, including provisions regarding restrictions on investment of Note Proceeds, the payment procedure under the municipal bond insurance policy, the rights of the bond insurer in the event of default and payment of the Notes by the bond insurer and notices to be given to the bond insurer. In addition, appropriate reference to the municipal bond insurance policy shall be made in the form of Note provided herein.

Section 18. Conflicting Resolutions; Severability; Effective Date. All prior resolutions, rules or other actions of the County Board of Supervisors or any parts thereof in conflict with the provisions hereof shall be, and the same are, hereby rescinded insofar as the same may so conflict. In the event that any one or more provisions hereof shall for any reason be held to be illegal or invalid, such illegality or invalidity shall not affect any other provisions hereof. The foregoing shall take effect immediately upon adoption and approval in the manner provided by law.
