Elizabeth Gilbert stated she is the Chief Operating Officer at Roger's Behavioral Health for the West Allis Inpatient Campus as well as outpatient services. There is also a Kenosha location which services adults, adolescents and children in the area. Carissa Buchanan, Director of Operations at Rogers Behavioral shared information about Rogers in our community which has been Kenosha for 15 years. Child and Adolescent program that provides either 3 hours or 6 hours of programming for ages 10 through 18 which shows them how to cope with stressful situations, how to improve their social relationships in their families and school. So, if they are struggling with stressful situations in their homes or schools they can provide them with the skills to improve their functioning in those areas. They also offer services for adults including general mental health and mental health and addiction. 91% of patients show improvement while in their system.

Isabella Ricker stated she is a member of the Youth In Governance and attends Tremper High School and is the Director of Community Service on Tremper's Exec Board of Student Government. One of their largest events is their blood drive which will be their 38th Annual Blood Drive and expect over 600 donations and they do except walk-ins.

CITIZEN COMMENTS

Kathy Deverney, 5602 1st Pl., stated she doesn't understand the need for Phase 2 & 3 of the KR Project much less fast tracking it and feels it is an enormous waste of taxpayer money. It seems Racine County is pushing this agenda, she doesn't understand what's in it for Kenosha. KR is in need of improvement, but not in the amount of \$59,000,000.

Kevin Rannow, 5621 1st St., stated he has lived in his home on Hwy KR for 32 years. He would like to see the speed limit reduced from 45 mph to 35 mph. He has met with and or provided written comments to the DOT, County Executive, and Somers President 9 times since last April and sent 2 emails to the County Board Members; the Somers President has been the most responsive. He feels parts of KR should remain a county road with less private land being taken and fewer trees removed.

Kathy Dahl, 101 56th Ave., stated she is a homeowner who lives on KR and will be directly affected by the Phase 2 project. She agrees improvements need to be made to KR but she is not in support of the plan as currently proposed. She would like this project to be re-evaluated with the concerns and consideration of the voting taxpaying residents that live along KR. For years homeowners on KR has been asking the speed limit to be lowered to 35 mph. Now the plan is to increase it to 50 mph. She feels the \$59,000,000 to widen KR to 4 lanes could be spread out to fix the awful conditions of the roads throughout the city and county of Kenosha.

Haley Bell, 6119 1st St., stated her family home is located on KR. The four lane proposed road will take away the rural feeling of the property which is the reason they purchased it and remained there for over 20 years. She feels this has been rushed through for a company which has a history of broken promises.

Leslie Maj, 7820 County Line Rd., stated she lives in Racine, so Kenosha County is off the hook as far as land requisition from them, but she wanted everyone to know what the super highway is going to do to her front yard as well as her neighbors. Her fruit trees, her aspens and landscaping will all be gone. She also spoke of the safety of the residents who live along KR. With this road expansion, traffic will no doubt increase. 45 mph through a residential neighborhood is too fast and unsafe. Safety of the residents should take precedence over commuter convenience. The noise level is also a concern, the days of enjoying her front porch will be over. She asked that alternative studies be done or alternatives be given to make both the county and residents happy. She also spoke of suppression of information from WI DOT to Racine County which was not shared with Racine County Supervisors.

Barbara Vass, 4007 1st St. stated at a meeting in Mt. Pleasant WI DOT had assured her that all of the public comments have been shared with the board and she asked for common courtesy of the board and to read about what the residents are concerned about. She doesn't see any advantage to Kenosha County with this project.

Kim Mahoney, 10640 S Prairie View Dr., stated she and her husband are the last remaining homeowners in Foxconn Area 1. They were assured by Mt. Pleasant that the law does not allow their property to be taken by eminent domain. She does not know why Phase 2 is being pushed through so quickly with claims Phase 2 is not part of the Foxconn development. She feels the residents that are being directly impacted by this project are being reasonable, the DOT and Racine County are not; the jury is still out on Kenosha County. Mt. Pleasant and Racine County made the decision to spend \$900,000,000 on a wealthy foreign company and another \$59,000,000 on a road that affects both Racine and Kenosha Counties.

Esther Roberts, 2772 11th Pl., stated that although she is not directly affected by the KR project she is here to support her friends in Somers and Mt. Pleasant who are. She respectfully asked to slow the decision down, and look for a less impactful alternative and to represent the people who voted for and elected the supervisors.

ANNOUNCMENTS OF THE CHAIRMAN

Chairman Esposito stated If any supervisors are having issues with their iPads to see the County Clerk or I.T. The next County Board Meeting will be on Wednesday, April 3, 2019. This is changed due to the Spring Election on April 2nd.

SUPERVISOR REPORTS

Supervisor Elverman stated the new Activity Guide for Parks is on the desks; it's very well done and many are pleased with the activities that have been expanded. Depending on the weather Golf was expected to open on March 15th. Golf attended shows in Milwaukee and Chicago and gave out 3750 coupons at the Chicago show. The Superintendent of Petrifying Springs Golf Course retired after 32 years with Kenosha County; Ryan Retherford was hired to replace him. The Courthouse chiller replacement will be completed by April 19th, Branch 1 courtroom is on schedule and Anderson Art Center project is ongoing. The Public Safety Building Shooting Range is fully operational. The winter has been very stressful on the Highway Department, so far this year they have used 6400 tons of salt compared to 6500 tons used in the entire season last year. All of the Hwy projects he has been reporting on are still on schedule including the Hwy S project scheduled to begin in 2020. Boundless Adventures is on schedule for a spring opening in the Pringle Nature Center.

Supervisor Nudo stated he attended the NACo Conference in Washington D.C. which was very informative and was able to discuss ideas with representatives from all over the United States. He and others asked for help with a Bill which Senator Baldwin is now drafting which will benefit our veterans. Senator Wanggaard spoke at the Legislative Meeting giving an update on the budget and other related issues.

Supervisor Gaschke wanted to thank the Kenosha County dedicated Social Workers for all that they do to make our community a better place. Today, March 19, 2019 is World Social Work Day, which is a day set aside annually on the 3rd Tuesday in March to recognize the accomplishments of Social Workers all around the world. Every day, Kenosha County Social Workers work hard to advocate and care for the most vulnerable in our community in their times of greatest need.

CITIZEN COMMENTS

Jeannine Brokmeier 5632 1st Pl., asked the board to reconsider their support for the current plan for Hwy KR. The DOT has brought forth a plan costing \$59,000,000 for 2.8 miles of road with a foot print wider than Hwy 31. She asked that the board takes the time to visit the site and talk to the residents. She would not want the mistakes made in Mt. Pleasant to be duplicated here. The DOT has their own agendas; that should not be our agendas.

Leslie Maj, 7820 County Line Rd. stated the power of eminent domain is scary when it is facing them, and the board holds the power over them right now. The safety of their neighborhoods, the noise level and their home values are in jeopardy. She is a Mt. Pleasant resident who stands to lose 103 feet of her front yard which places this super highway feet from her front door and fears she will never be able to sell her home in the future. She feels this is all for Foxconn, a company that appears to have scaled back significantly with their original plans. To move forward with this project in its current form without further study is morally and fiscally irresponsible. She also would like the speed limit on Hwy KR to be reduced and not increased as planned.

Al Brokmeier 5632 1st Pl., stated the speed limit they are proposing for Hwy KR is 50 mph which is ridiculous for a residential area. The footprint for this roadway is huge, it is similar to Hwy 31; there needs to be a roadway that is less intrusive to people but still serve the needs of a four lane highway. He does not believe there is a need of two overpasses at the cost of between 15 and 20 million dollars. An overpass would create a hill into a residential area at 50 mph which is a safety issue.

Chairman Esposito stated that because of the election the night before the committee structure will change, many of the committee assignments potentially will remain the same and will begin in May.

SUPERVISOR REPORTS

Supervisor Rodriguez spoke of a presentation he went to regarding Emergency Management of which a packet was emailed to each supervisor. He explained ways an emergency can be declared in Kenosha County. There is a parole hearing in May for an inmate who killed someone and has no remorse and he asked Corporation Counsel to draft a resolution encouraging the parole board to not release this individual. The resolution will be in the clerk's office if any supervisors wish to sign on.

Supervisor Gentz stated he read in the paper that there were four overdoses in one week in Kenosha County. He asked that the Chairman put on the agenda the first week of May a report on what the Opioid Task Force is and what they are doing. Regarding the Public Works joint meeting next week, there are no citizen comments so he thinks the changes should be made public ahead of time so citizens know what they are and can contact their County Board Supervisor if necessary.

Supervisor Grady stated he attended both meetings with the DOT in Somers and it was very well attended. He thinks it is important to understand the phases of the KR project in particular the one runs from the frontage road to Hwy H; that one is huge. They're talking 9 to 10 lanes at the intersection of KR and H. The one thing that every citizen commented on at the meetings was about speed. If you have a road that allows for higher speed, that will be the default presentation.

Supervisor Elverman stated there will be a joint meeting with Public Works and Finance to go over acquisition paperwork with possible action. In Facilities, the heat pump replacement for the Administration Building should begin soon. Pre-construction meeting for the Public Safety Building parking lot paving is scheduled for the next few weeks. Focus on Energy is working in connection with our utility company. The county has been doing this for years, the jail dorm lights have been upgraded to LED with a project cost estimate of \$26,000 with potential incentives from the utility company of \$9,000. The annual savings for just this project is \$43,362. The Anderson Art Center project is ongoing and the targeted completion of the Branch 1 Courtroom is June 10th. Both the Hwy S project Hwy F re-alignment are still scheduled fot of 2020 Hwy K project will not be next year as they thought.

Boundless Adventures in Bristol Park is almost complete. There will be the weekly Friday movie nights at Pets again this year. Picnic in the Park with be on August 24th at Pets.

Supervisor Reports

Supervisor Elverman reported from the Public Works/Facilities Committee. In golf operations, the County Open is on August 9th and 11th, will take place at both Strawberry Creek and Brighton Dale. The County Executive Cup will be September 11th. It raises funds for the junior golf program, which consist of 160 children. Junior Golf Clinics at the golf courses finished up with 125 participants. They will be redoing the bids for the Petrifying Springs park path replacements, since the bids were too high. At Brighton Dale the sediment pond will be upgraded, using their own sewer treatment plan. In facilities project update, the courthouse chiller, the air conditioning is available but there are still some issues. The Kenosha County Center will be going through a chiller replacement, that bid was accepted for \$253K, it was estimated \$260K, came in under budget and completion will be next April. Anderson Arts Center is on schedule with a November completion. Branch 1 courtroom ribbon cutting was on the 15th of July. Bids for the Kemper Center modernization have been rejected and will be rebid in the fall. Pike River restoration is complete. Picnic in the Park at Petrifying Springs Park will be held on August 24th. Most highway projects are on schedule and have paved almost 5 miles. Twilight Tour will be at the KD Park and The Starry Nights Farm and Red Oak Restaurant will be catering the event. This will be on Thursday, September 5th and cost will be \$15 per person. There will be a walking tour of the park and the farm.

Supervisor Yuhas gave an update on behalf of the Pringle Nature Center Board year-end report. During June 2018-June 2019, 231 volunteers contributed 1,298.25 hours of service to the PNC. 3,232 visitors came without participating in programs, 3,561 participated in programs for a total of 6,793 people enjoying the PNC. The home school science program, being well attended and had a total of 21 programs. There were 3 scouts programs scheduled and a few by request badge programs for a total of 26 programs. Summer camp sessions continued to fill up. There were also 61 public programs held. The Halloween Hike had 300 participants, the Maple Syrup Hike had 170 participants, Leave No Child Inside had 113 participants and Mud day had 200 participants. Three large fundraisers over the last year. In September, Fall Fun Fest had 250 participants. In November, Bristol Woods Train had 73 participants and The Mother's Day brunch had 32 participants despite the weather. PNC is collaborating with Boundless Adventures staff to help facilitate possible cross programming opportunities. The Center had been utilized 8 times in the past year for weddings, birthday parties and group meetings. Upcoming events are: Invasive Species Workday, Saturday, August 24th, 9-12; Leave No Child Inside: Summer's Last Fling!, Saturday, August 24th, 10 am-3 pm; Fitness Hike, Tuesday, September 3rd, 10-11 am and Fall Fun Fest, Saturday, September 21st, 11 am-3 pm. There was a bill introduced in the State Senate and Assembly to have a 1% sales tax in Milwaukee County, part of this was to go to fund public transit. He requested that the County Board consider drafting a resolution to have a County Sales Tax to fund public transit.

Lynda Pfeiffer, 1345 97th Ave, stated that she has been a Kenosha County employee for over 30 years. She is representing Kenosha County employees and members of AFSCME Union Local 990. She addressed the misconception that Kenosha County employees receive an annual cost of living pay increase. In the last 7 years all employees have only received a one-time across the board pay increase of \$.25 in 2014. A job study was conducted in 2015 and for many employees it resulted in a one-time \$500 payment. Since 2013 the annual inflation rate has gone up 11.66%. Compared to the Sheriff's Department wages which have increased 11% over the past 7 years. She encouraged Supervisors to invest in the hourly employees by including an across the board 5% cost of living increase in the 2020 budget.

At Bristol Woods Park, Vail Corporation's "Epic Promise", had 80 volunteers that completed tasks equal to \$4,800. Both phases of the County "S" 142 project are on schedule for Spring 2020. County F realignment is scheduled for 2020. A section of KR, from County H to State Highway 31, scheduled for Fall 2020. Golf had the best season in 6 years. The Annual Paddock Lake Oktoberfest was successful. He praised the Kenosha County work crew leadership and stated this program has been a huge asset to Kenosha County and the young people it involves.

Jack Rose, 4315 68th St., 15th District Alderman for City Counsel. He spoke about the National Alliance on Mental Illness, improving the quality of life for people living with mental illness in our community. Through the efforts of the County and the City they have created a Crisis Prevention Center built for 16 beds and currently fully staffed. Last month 100 people received care at that facility. A study was done showing the one month hold allowed the county to save \$42,000. Bridges Community Center, providing recovery support for adults, is now open Monday-Saturday. Kenosha County is applying for a \$5,000 tad grant and NAMI Kenosha will provide in-kind support. Through the collaboration with the Sheriff's Department, NAMI will continue to provide a no cost 5 day course for crisis intervention team training. To date they have trained over 288 law enforcement in our County since 2010. One of the First recipients of the Martha Halliwell scholarships has received his Master's in Nursing from Marquette University. He has joined Kenosha Human Development Services as a nurse and will be certified as an advanced practice nurse practitioner in December of 2020. Encouraged the board to support the mental health and substance abuse portion of the Human Services budget.

Todd Battle, 1613 36th Ave., President of KABA. Thank you for the continued support in the budget process in terms of your support of economic development. The partnership that the KABA and the County has had around economic development has been successful. Applaud the County for their approach to fiscal management, forward thinking and innovativeness around supporting the community growth. He encouraged the Supervisors to continue to showing the leadership in terms of investing in the community.

Announcements Of The Chairman

Chairman Esposito welcomed Charlotte Martin of the Judiciary & Law Committee from the YIG.

He stated the Red Cross will have free fire alarms available on October 12th. Volunteers from the Red Cross, Kenosha Fire Department and Journey Church will install these smoke alarms in homes across Kenosha. If anyone wants to volunteer they can RSVP by October 10th. This email was forwarded to all Supervisors.

He spoke about the budget and directed the Supervisors to the detailed Budget Hearing schedule. Vice Chairman O'Day stated that the Kenosha History Center is having their 15th Annual Chili Cook-off at Parkway Chateau on Saturday, October 19, 2019. Proceeds will help offset the costs of the flood at the History Center 3 weeks ago.

Supervisor Elverman gave a Public Works update. Anderson Arts Center is near completion. On Sept. 15, 2019, the basement flooded with a sewer back up that affected the neighborhood of 3rd Ave. The cost to the County for the clean-up was \$20,000. This has not happened before, but they are looking into ways to prevent future occurrences. All highway projects are on schedule, major repaving projects are complete, and Highway Dept is preparing for the winter season. The Parks have been extremely busy. Golf courses will remain open; Pets will remain open until near December, weather permitting. Facilities on-going projects are all on schedule, and they are bidding new projects.

Supervisor Nudo reported that the Legislative Committee had their budget meeting earlier that night, and passed the budget unanimously.

Supervisor Yuhas reported that on Oct. 3, she presented John McCabe, President of the Bristol Historical Society, a check for \$5,000 during their annual meeting. She thanked the board who voted in the 2019 budget to give this one-time donation for the improvements to the original Village Hall, which has been relocated. The money will be used for restoration and education. She also attended the Military and Veterans family day at Boundless Adventures on Friday, Oct. 4. Veterans and their immediate families were invited to climb for free. Proceeds of this event went to the Southern WI Airborne Chapter 82nd Airborne Division. Over 100 families attended this event.

Phil Allen, 9021 262nd Ave, Salem. He is the VFW Dept. of WI State Chaplain and Hospital Director. He also served as Chief of Staff for VFW Dist. 1. He is a member of VFW Post 73, American Legion Post 21. He served in the US Navy in Vietnam '67-'68 where he earned his right to become a veteran of foreign wars. He stated when they came back from Vietnam they were spit upon, swore at and neglected. Veteran's Memorial Park will honor all of our veterans in the community and it's very important that they are shown that we care about them. Supervisor Reports

Supervisor Elverman reported from Parks – Boundless Adventures end of the season report, KC share of the gross revenue amount was \$21,081, created 25 new local jobs, used only local contractors and businesses to build the park. They donated free climbing experiences to the Boys and Girls Club, Summer Youth Employment Program participants, veterans and their families, school groups and local non-profits. Fox River Park received a donation from a WE Energies Foundation of \$2,500 to assist in reforestation efforts. Petrifying Springs Biergarten end of season report estimated over 65,000 customers, KC share of the gross revenue amount was \$66,582, created 25 local jobs, held 100 special events, gave \$18,500 in local community donations to Boys and Girls Club, Education Foundation of Kenosha, Safe Harbor Humane Society, Kenosha WILDD Inc. and the United Way of Kenosha County. Park fees will remain the same in 2020. Brighton Dale Links officially closed 10/31/2019. Petrifying Springs is open, walking only, when it is over 40 degrees and they are currently holding the holiday golf sales. KCC chiller replacement and the P&D remodeling is ongoing. Anderson Art Center will be complete in December. Joint Services evidence area renovation is in the process of verifying the bids. Highway Dept. all road projects are on schedule.

He announced that after serving on the County Board for 25 years he will not be running for re-election in the 2020 spring election.
