



NOTICE OF SPRING ELECTION SAMPLE BALLOT AND REFERENDUMS APRIL 5, 2022



OFFICE OF THE KENOSHA COUNTY CLERK TO THE VOTERS OF KENOSHA COUNTY:

Notice is hereby given of a spring election to be held in Kenosha County on Tuesday, April 5, 2022, at which the officers named below shall be nominated. The names of the candidates for each office, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office, each in its proper column, together with the questions submitted to a vote, for a referendum, if any, in the sample ballot below.

Information to Voters

Upon entering the polling place and before being permitted to vote, a voter shall:

- state their name and address
- show an acceptable form of photo identification*
- sign the poll book**

***If a voter does not have acceptable photo identification, the voter may obtain a free photo ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles.**

****If the voter is unable to sign the poll book due to disability, a poll worker may write the word "exempt."**

If a voter is not registered to vote, they may register to vote at the polling place serving their residence if the voter provides proof of residence.

Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot.

Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall enter a voting booth or go to a machine and cast their ballot. The vote should not be cast in any manner other than specified here. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in marking their ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

A voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward.

An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

Assistance for Voting

A voter may select an individual to assist in casting their vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that they are unable to read, have difficulty reading, writing, or

understanding English, or that due to disability are unable to cast their ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter.

Where Optical Scan Voting is Used

The voter shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of their choice for each office for which they intend to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of their choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval next to the write-in line. On referendum questions, the voter shall fill in the oval next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall fill in the oval next to "no" if opposed to the question.

When using an *electronic ballot marking device* "ExpressVote," to mark an **optical scan ballot**, the voter shall touch the screen to select the name of the candidate of their choice for each office for which they intend to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of their choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall touch the screen to select "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall touch the screen to select "no" if opposed to the question.

After Voting the Ballot

After an official **optical scan ballot** is marked, it may be inserted in the security sleeve, so the marks do not show. The voter shall insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. If a central count system is used, the voter shall insert the ballot in the ballot box and discard the sleeve or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The voter shall leave the polling place promptly.

Spoiled Ballots

If a voter spoils an **optical scan** ballot, they shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place.

REFERENDUM RESOLUTIONS

NOTICE OF REFERENDUM - TREVOR-WILMOT CONSOLIDATED SCHOOL DISTRICT- APRIL 5, 2022

At an election to be held in the Trevor-Wilmot Consolidated School District on April 5, 2022, the following proposed Revenue Limit Resolution of the School Board will be submitted to a vote of the people:

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE SCHOOL DISTRICT BUDGET TO EXCEED REVENUE LIMIT BY \$800,000 PER YEAR FOR FIVE YEARS FOR NON-RECURRING PURPOSES

BE IT RESOLVED by the School Board of the Trevor-Wilmot Consolidated School District, Kenosha County, Wisconsin that the revenues included in the School District budget be authorized to exceed the revenue limit specified in Section 121.91, Wisconsin Statutes, by \$800,000 per year beginning with the 2022-2023 school year and ending with the 2026-2027 school year, for non-recurring purposes consisting of maintaining current class sizes, educational programs and services, and meeting current district expenses.

The question will appear on the ballot as follows:

Question: "Shall the Trevor-Wilmot Consolidated School District, Kenosha County, Wisconsin be authorized to exceed the revenue limit specified in Section 121.91, Wisconsin Statutes, by \$800,000 per year beginning with the 2022-2023 school year and ending with the 2026-2027 school year, for non-recurring purposes consisting of maintaining current class sizes, educational programs and services, and meeting current district expenses?"

Explanation: The referendum election ballot will ask District electors to vote "yes" or "no" on the referendum election question as set forth above.

A **"yes"** vote on the question is a vote to authorize the Trevor-Wilmot Consolidated School District budget to exceed the revenue limit specified in Section 121.91, Wisconsin Statutes, by \$800,000 per year beginning with the 2022-2023 school year and ending with the 2026-2027 school year, for non-recurring purposes consisting of maintaining current class sizes, educational programs and services, and meeting current district expenses.

A **"no"** vote on the question is a vote to deny the Trevor-Wilmot Consolidated School District the authority to exceed the revenue limit specified in Section 121.91, Wisconsin Statutes, by \$800,000 per year beginning with the 2022-2023 school year and ending with the 2026-2027 school year, for non-recurring purposes consisting of maintaining current class sizes, educational programs and services, and meeting current district expenses.

In the event a majority of the electors voting on the question vote "yes", the District will be authorized to exceed the revenue limit specified in Section 121.91, Wisconsin Statutes, by \$800,000 per year beginning with the 2022-2023 school year and ending with the 2026-2027 school year, for non-recurring purposes consisting of maintaining current class sizes, educational programs and services, and meeting current district expenses; if a majority vote "no" on the question set forth above, the District will not be so authorized.

WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin has imposed limits on town, village, city and county property tax levies under Wis. Stat. §66.0602; and

WHEREAS, Wis. Stat. §66.0602 limits the increase in 2022 to the local property tax levy to no more than the greater of (a) 0% of last year's actual levy or (b) a percentage equal to the percentage change in equalized value due to new construction less improvements removed plus other exceptions like new debt service; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Pleasant Prairie actual levy in 2021 (collected in 2022) was \$14,252,940; and, based upon the percentage change in equalized value due to new construction less improvements removed plus new debt service, state law would limit the increase to \$366,787 for a total allowable 2022 (collected in 2023) Village tax levy of \$14,619,727; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Pleasant Prairie is presently served by thirty-six (36) full-time sworn police officers and four (4) additional police officers are required to maintain existing level of law enforcement services and/or enhance future services; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Pleasant Prairie is presently served by twenty-seven (27) full-time fire and rescue personnel and twelve (12) additional personnel are required to maintain existing level of fire and rescue services and/or enhance future services; and

WHEREAS, the increased costs necessary to add the additional required personnel to support the Village's public safety present and future needs would exceed the Village's maximum allowable levy; and

WHEREAS, the Village Board of the Village of Pleasant Prairie, Kenosha County, Wisconsin believes it is in the Village's best interest to exceed the state levy limit as described above by a greater percentage than allowed by statute in order to increase the number of sworn police officers and fire and rescue personnel.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Village Board of the Village of Pleasant Prairie, Kenosha County, Wisconsin, do hereby support an increase in the Village tax levy for 2022 (collected in 2023) to exceed the state levy limit. The Village of Pleasant Prairie intends that the levy increase be applied on an ongoing basis thereafter by including it in the base used to calculate the limit going forward.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Village of Pleasant Prairie directs that the question of increasing the village tax levy for 2022 (to be collected in 2023) by 10.94%, which would increase the village levy by \$1,600,000 over the past year's levy, for a Village tax levy of \$16,219,727, shall be submitted to the electors in a referendum election to be held on April 5, 2022, in the following form:

The question will appear on the ballot as follows:

Question: "Under state law, the increase in the levy of the Village of Pleasant Prairie for the tax to be imposed for the next fiscal year, 2023, is limited to 2.57%, which results in a levy of \$14,619,727. Shall the Village of Pleasant Prairie be allowed to exceed this limit and increase the levy for the next fiscal year, 2023, for the purpose of hiring and retaining additional sworn police officers and fire and rescue personnel, by a total of 10.94%, which results in a levy of \$16,219,727, and on an ongoing basis, include the increase of \$1,600,000 for each fiscal year going forward?"

EXPLANATION

Explanatory Statement and Effect of Vote

The Village of Pleasant Prairie is currently served by thirty-six (36) sworn police officers and twenty-seven (27) full-time fire and rescue personnel. In order to add additional full-time staff to maintain existing level of public safety services and/or enhance future services, the Village's costs would exceed the maximum allowable state-imposed levy.

A "yes" vote allows the Village Board to exceed the state-imposed levy limits to provide additional funding to pay for four (4) additional police officers and twelve (12) additional fire and rescue personnel. The increased levy would apply on an ongoing basis thereafter by including it in the base used to calculate the limit going forward.

A "no" vote does not allow the Village Board to exceed the state-imposed levy limits to provide additional funding for four (4) additional police officers and twelve (12) additional fire and rescue personnel. EXPLANATION

Presently, both the office of Town Clerk in the Town of Wheatland and the office of Town Treasurer in the Town of Wheatland are elected positions. The statutes of the State of Wisconsin provide that the Town, by a majority vote of the electorate, may authorize the Town Board to convert each of these positions from an elective office to an appointed office.

A "yes" answer to either of the foregoing questions would authorize the Town Board to make this conversion whereas a "no" answer would indicate to the Town Board that the position should remain elective.

In the event that a majority of the electors authorize the Town Board to create appointed positions for one or both of the offices of Town Clerk and Town Treasurer, the appointed office would not commence until the expiration of the term of the current elected officials in each position.
