WHEREAS, the Compliance Program will assist Brookside Care Center in providing health care services in a manner that complies with applicable federal and state laws and regulations, and meets the highest standards of professional ethics and integrity;

WHEREAS, the Compliance Program will foster an organizational culture at Brookside Care Center that promotes and enables the achievement of compliance with these ethical standards and legal requirements; and

WHEREAS, the Compliance Program, as described in the Compliance Plan and including the Code of Conduct, establishes a continuous process for the improvement of Brookside Care Center's business policies and practices and to carry out its oversight responsibilities under state and federal laws and regulations; and

WHEREAS, the Compliance Program includes the following elements required by the applicable laws and regulations, including; (a) Designation of a Compliance Officer, the Human Services Committee, and a Brookside Care Center operations-level compliance committee; (b) Establishment of a written Compliance Plan and Code of Conduct; (c) Development of policies and procedures addressing specific areas of compliance risk, including potential fraud and abuse; (d) General education and training on the compliance program and compliance issues; (e) Specialized education and training on compliance risk areas; (f) Internal reporting mechanism for employees to communicate questions and concerns about compliance; (g) Use of audits and other monitoring techniques for compliance; (h) A procedure for the investigation and remediation of identified problems; (i) Establishment and enforcement of disciplinary standards for ensuring commitment and participation in the compliance program; and (j) Annual evaluation of the effectiveness of the compliance program.

78. From Judiciary & Law and Finance/Administration Committees Regarding WI DOT Kenosha County PreTrial Intensive Supervision Program XVII Grant Award for 2013-2014 and Supplemental Award for the 2012-2013 Program.

WHEREAS, the Kenosha County Sheriff's Department has been awarded \$70,000 by the WI Dept. of Transportation (DOT) to support expenditures for the "Kenosha County Sheriff's Department DUI Intensive Supervision Program" now in its 17th year, and

WHEREAS, the funding award period is July 1, 2013 through June 30, 2014, and

WHEREAS, the total operating budget for the Kenosha County 2013-2014 Intensive Supervision Program (ISP) is \$162,573 funded by four sources:

- (1) State DOT grant \$70,000
- (2) Client Fees collected by Wisconsin Community Services, Inc. totaling \$26,788
- (3) Sheriff's Dept. In-kind match of \$20,785 (Safety Building office space for WCS Inc. and Sheriff oversight labor costs)
- (4) Sheriff's Department hard match of \$45,000, approved via 2014 budget adoption, and

WHEREAS, WI DOT also awarded a supplemental award of \$1,079 under the prior ISP grant

program approved by the County Board via Resolution # 55, passed on November 7, 2012, for the spending period that ended June 30, 2013; these funds were used to afford a supply of drug testing equipment mouthpieces used by the WCS staff in monitoring clients, and

WHEREAS, the 2013-2014 ISP program will continue to be facilitated by the Wisconsin Community Services, Inc. (WCS) out of Milwaukee, WI for which a contract for services will be reviewed by county Administration, and

WHEREAS, repeat DWI offenders will be screened by WCS, Inc. to receive intensive counseling treatment and supervision in lieu of incarceration in an effort to effectively deter repeat offenses, and

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Kenosha County Board of Supervisors accept the awards from WI DOT **totaling \$71,079** and approve the Revenue and Expenditure line item modifications to the **Sheriff's 2013 budget** as per the attached budget modification form, which are incorporated herein by reference.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that any unobligated DOT ISP grant funds remaining at year end 2013 be hereby authorized for carryover to 2014 budget year until such time as the grant funds are expended in accord with the WI Dept of Transp ISP grant requirements, and that the Administration be authorized to modify the grant appropriations among various budget and expenditure units within the Sheriff's Department in accordance with all federal and state regulations of the program and in compliance with generally accepted accounting principles.

WHEREAS, the grant funds offered will be used to reimburse personnel costs associated with increased patrol presence to enforce alcohol/drug impaired drivers at targeted times and areas and to purchase law enforcement equipment: Intoximeter Alco sensor devices, and

WHEREAS, the 25% local match required is met with soft dollars within the current budget and will not require any additional tax levy dollars.

Stats., addresses the sale by a county to another municipality of property taken by tax deed;

ANNOUNCEMENTS OF THE CHAIRMAN

Chairman Gentz spoke of what the board had accomplished the past two years. Some of his goals were regarding small businesses and to wrap up the lawsuit with the Health Department. The tax levy numbers are better than they have been in 25yrs. There have been about 3,100 jobs created the past two years. With the help of KABA, County Executive, City of Kenosha there has been \$525,000,000 in capital investments along with the High Impact Fund and other incentives. Brookside Care Center and the golf courses have been two years in the black. The county's general fund balance is over 17% which hasn't been the case since 2006. He thanked the board for working with him and working with each other to get these things done. He also thanked the County Executive and the Administration Staff and the Employees and looks forward to continue working together for the constituents of Kenosha County.

Chairman Gentz thanked outgoing Supervisors Underhill, Nudo, and Molinaro for their service and presented them each with a plaque.

SUPERVISOR REPORTS

Supervisor Rose stated two years ago, Chairman Gentz appointed the Finance/Administration Committee with different walks of life along with different political view points. This came at a time of the worst economic time since the Great Depression. The committee got down to work and recognized what was best for the community. With the assistance of the County Executive, Dave Geersten and Al Swartz, presented two budgets to this County Board for endorsement. 2013 budget had a 0% levy increase and the 2014 1.8% levy increase. Those are the numbers we can be proud of. Neither Brookside nor golf have been in the red, the roads have been paved, the snow has been cleared, the buildings have been maintained and the employees have not been laid-off. The services that we have had traditionally have been continued. They have always tried to maintain 17% of operating expenses in the General Fund; in 2014 there is 19.73%. That is an outstanding accomplishment considering the current economic situation. He thanked Supervisors R. Frederick, O'Day, Grady, Kohlmeier, Kubicki and Molinaro for working together and making his job easier. He concluded with his final remark, "a job well done."

Supervisor Hallmon gave a report on the NACo Annual Legislative Conference which was held in Washington DC last March. He stated he cherished that the outgoing supervisor of the 15th District pushed him to be brighter and more intelligent. He thanked Chairman Gentz for having a 21st Century leading style, meaning he brings people together, asks for their thoughts and ideas and actually listens. He also thanked him for making him chair of the Human Services Committee.

Supervisor Breunig thanked the members of the Planning, Development and Extension Education Committee. She noted some of what the committee accomplished in the past two years which includes, 23 Comprehensive Plan Amendment Applications, 39 Rezoning Applications, 34 Conditional Use Permits, 16 Certified Survey Maps and 1 Subdivision Platt Application. There is a new Youth Development Educator in Extension Education. Youth In Governance has had 107 members since the start of the program thanks to Supervisor Molinaro who brought this program to Kenosha County. New members will be appointment at the May 20th County Board Meeting. 4H has grown tremendously along with Horticulture and many other programs. It's been a busy two years.

Supervisor Molinaro stated his journey on the County Board for the past 20 years has been rewarding and full of accomplishments. Some notable accomplishments include the High Impact Development Fund, downsizing and re-organizing the County Board while he was Chairman, and Youth In Governance. There

is no solo performance in what was done; it takes a majority. It was because of former Chairman Bob Carbone, who took a risk on a twenty something year old kid when he appointed him in 1994. He thanked Tedi Winnett for developing and implementing the Youth In Governance Program when he had the idea to get youth more involved in county government. He also enjoyed working with County Executive Kreuser and wished him all the best as he was just sworn in for the next four years. He is glad he was able to be a part of Kenosha County.

Supervisor Elverman stated the golf courses are open for the season. Two years in a row golf has not shown a loss. The 60th St. tower has had a setback; they are now looking at May for completion. The work on the Administration Building has begun and should continue all summer. He is looking forward to the new session and what the board can get accomplished.

Supervisor Esposito thanked the Judiciary & Law Committee for their past session. They had a lot of tough issues in which they hit head on. He also thanked Supervisor Molinaro; Kenosha County is a better place because of him being a County Board Supervisor.

WHEREAS, the budgetary pricing used in preparing the Sheriff's Department's 2014 capital projects for the detentions portable radio system upgrade is not enough to cover the cost of the software/hardware necessary to make the 'man-down' feature on the portable radios operational. The cost for this is \$56,923.00.

WHEREAS, funding for the portable radio project is \$200,000.

WHEREAS, purchase orders have been issued for the supply of new portable radios/charging units/batteries/repeaters/cabling/radio desk sets/control stations/software/installation and programming totaling \$162,505.85.

WHEREAS, the unencumbered balance of the bonded funds for the portable radio upgrade is \$37,494.15 –Communications Equip. The additional \$21,792 requested will provide enough funds in Communications Equip. for the Man Down software/hardware proposal.

WHEREAS, the bonded funds approved for the Control Rooms Security Software upgrade/licenses, \$15,675-Machy/Equip, will not be needed as negotiations with the vendor for the service/maintenance contract for the jail control rooms security system has this project cost worked into a 2-year service contract that was proposed and entered into for 2014 and 2015.

WHEREAS, with the current success of the electronic monitoring (EM) program, traffic of Huber release inmates to/from the detention facility is reduced. Bed space is available to house Huber inmates who are not on the EM program and can be kept separate from the regular population. The funding for the Walk-Through Metal Detector totaling \$6,117-Machy/Equip. will not be need. The metal detector was requested due to having to regularly mix Huber inmates with regular confinement inmates due to bed space limits. We will review the need for this metal detector when preparing the 2015 budget.

ANNOUNCEMENTS OF THE CHAIRMAN

Chairman Kubicki welcomed Youth In Governance Member Rianna Hrycat who was in attendance at the meeting. There is an opening on the Pringle Nature Center Board if anyone is interested. He welcomed new partners in business Kendall Manufacturing and Insinkerator to Kenosha County.

SUPERVISOR REPORTS

Supervisor Grady stated the 60th St. tower is in its final process and should be operational by July 14th. The inspection of the Yule House has been postponed to give the buyers more time to sell their house in California. Sale should be completed in the near future. The restoration of the Administration Building is on schedule and should be completed by the end of October. The intersection of HWY C and H will be closed for construction from June 16th through Labor Day. There will be a public information hearing on June 12 regarding the existing Pike Creek Bridge renovation project in 2016. The hill road near the Golf Course in Petrifying Springs Park has been rebuilt to only allow foot and bicycle traffic. The Kemper Pier removal has been scheduled. There will be dedicated mountain bike trails at Silver Lake Park. After a slow and damp start, golf is doing well.

Supervisor Rose encouraged the board to read the article in the paper regarding new EPA rules which he believes will have a great impact on the economic development in this county and state. He hopes the Executive or Legislative Committee will take a look at this issue.

Supervisor Gentz asked for clarification with the sale of the Yule House. Supervisor Grady explained that although the house the buyers are selling is desirable, the wild fires in California is making it difficult for the realtors to show the house. Supervisor Gentz also stated the Evaluation Committee for the Public Safety Software is meeting this week with one of the final two vendors to narrow it down to one to bring it to the Joint Services Board.

Supervisor Hallmon stated the Human Services Committee met and welcomed their two new Youth In Governance Members. He spoke of the role the Board of Health takes as far as providing guidance to the Health Department. ORDINANCE 1

1. From Executive Committee regarding amendment of MCKC 2.05 re County Board Standing Committees.

THE KENOSHA COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS DOES HEREBY ORDAIN that Municipal Code of Kenosha County Section 2.05, dealing with Standing Committees of the County Board, is hereby amended as follows:

2.05 <u>Standing Committees</u>

- (1) The Standing Committees of the County Board shall be as follows:
 - (a) Finance and Administration Committee
 - (b) Judiciary and Law Enforcement Committee
 - (c) Public Works and Facilities Committee
 - (d) Planning, Development and Extension Education Committee
 - (e) Human Services Committee
 - (f) Executive Committee
 - (g) Legislative Committee

(2) Oversight Authority, Areas of Responsibility, and Powers.

Finance and Administration Committee.

1. All matters relating to purchasing, finance, taxes, budgets, assessments, audits, the sale, lease, purchase or disposition of any county lands or buildings (except highway right-of-way), **economic development**, Deferred Compensation, the Office of the County Clerk, the Office of the County Treasurer, the Office of the Register of Deeds, the Housing Authority, and the following Divisions of the Department of Administration: Financial Services, Information Services, and the Office of the Director which are to come before the County Board shall be referred to the Finance and Administration Committee.

2. Pursuant to section 59.07(3)(a) of the Wisconsin Statutes, the Finance and Administration Committee is delegated the power of the County Board in regard to current accounts, claims, demands, or causes of action against the County where the amount does not exceed \$5,000.

3. All matters relating to personnel matters arising out of Wisconsin Statutes Chapter 111, employee classification, reclassification, labor contracts, collective bargaining, employee safety and working conditions, insurance, risk management, and the Department of Administration Division of Personnel Services which are to come before the County Board shall be referred to the Finance and Administration Committee.

(b) Judiciary, and Law Enforcement Committee.

1. All matters relating to law enforcement, the jail, the house of corrections, the court system, the Sheriff's Department, the Office of Juvenile Intake, the Department of Administration Division of Emergency Services, the Department of Corrections, Conservation Wardens, the Office of the Clerk of Courts, and the Office of the District Attorney which are to come before the County Board shall be referred to the Judiciary and Law Enforcement Committee.

2. The Committee shall have the authority to review and act upon licenses and permits as set forth in Chapter 8 of the Municipal Code of Kenosha County.

Public Works and Facilities Committee.

(c)

(d)

1. All matters relating to highways, roads, dams, parks, recreation, and the Department of Public Works which are to come before the County Board shall be referred to the Public Works and Facilities Committee.

2. The Committee shall have the powers of a county park commission as defined in Wisconsin Statutes, Chapter 27 and the powers of the county highway committee as defined in Wisconsin Statutes, Chapter 83.

3. The Committee shall have the power to adopt rules and regulations for the administration of County Parks as set forth in section 10.02 of the Municipal Code of Kenosha County.

4. All matters relating to major repairs, remodeling, expansion, construction, demolition, purchase, sale, or lease of all county-owned buildings and grounds, including Kemper Center and the Historical Society which are to come before the County Board shall be referred to the Public Works and Facilities Committee.

Planning, Development and Extension Education Committee.

1. All matters relating to land use planning, development, shore land and floodplain issues, subdivision control, sanitation, interim reapportionment, the County Surveyor's Office, and the Department of Planning and Development, excluding the land conservation function, which are to come before the County Board shall be referred to the Planning, Development and Extension Education Committee.

2. The Planning, Development and Extension Education Committee shall act as the agent of the County Board in matters pertaining to county planning and development as outlined in the Wisconsin Statutes, section 59.97 as amended.

3. The Planning, Development and Extension Education Committee shall have the powers as set forth in Chapter 12 of the Municipal Code of Kenosha County in general and as set forth in section 12.03-4 of the Municipal Code of Kenosha County specifically.

4. All matters relating to the University of Wisconsin Cooperative Extension Office (including concerns related to agriculture, home economics, horticulture, 4-H youth development, and Community, Natural Resource, and Economic Development (CNRED)), soil and water conservation, and the Department of Planning and Development land conservation function which are to come before the County Board shall be referred to the Planning, Development and Extension Education Committee.

(e) <u>Human Services Committee</u>. All matters relating to community health, aging services, Brookside, the public welfare, child support, the Office of the Medical Examiner and the Department of Human Services which are to come before the County Board shall be referred to the Human Services Committee.

(f) <u>Executive Committee</u>. All matters relating to <u>strategic planning for the greater</u> <u>good of Kenosha County and other matters as deemed necessary and proper by the County Board</u> <u>Chair</u> the polices and rules of procedure of the County Board, intergovernmental relations, intergovernmental communications, pending or proposed legislation, economic development, the Office of the Corporation Counsel and other governmental matters which are to come before the County Board shall be referred to the Executive Committee. (g) Legislative Committee. All matters relating to the polices and rules of procedure of the County Board, intergovernmental relations, intergovernmental communications, pending or proposed legislation, the Office of the Corporation Counsel and other governmental matters which are to come before the County Board shall be referred to the Legislative Committee.

(3) Committee Assignments.

(a) Standing Committees of the County Board may at the discretion of the Board Chair consist of five (5) or seven (7) members except that the Finance and Administration Committee must have seven (7) members (and during the remainder of the 2010-2012 supervisory term, all committees shall have no fewer than seven (7) members).

(b) Every supervisor shall serve on at least one committee.

(c) No supervisor shall serve on more than two standing committees.

(d) No chairman of another standing committee may serve on the Finance and Administration Committee.

(e) The Finance and Administration Committee Chairman may not serve on any other standing committee except the Executive Committee.

(f) No more than two members from any one standing committee may serve on the Finance and Administration Committee.

(g) The Executive Committee shall consist of the Board Chair, Vice-Chair and each Committee Chair. In the event the Vice Chair is also a Committee Chair, the Chair of the Board shall appoint another Supervisor of his or her choosing.

(4) Committee Operations.

(a) The chairman of the County Board shall recommend a chairman, vice-chairman, and secretary of each standing committee. Each standing committee shall elect the chairman, vice-chairman and secretary.

(b) The chairman shall set the time and place for all meetings of the committee, shall check and list committee meeting dates with the County Clerk to avoid conflicts with other committee meetings, and shall report committee attendance to the County Clerk who shall maintain a record thereof.

(c) The committee vice-chairman shall act as chairman in the absence of the chairman.

(d) It is the responsibility of the committee Chair, in cooperation with the committee secretary and appropriate county oversight staff, to ensure that all proceeding minutes are recorded and posted to the County website in accordance with this policy.

All meeting minutes are to be documented using a digital audio recording device and a written text of the minutes.

The full digital recording from any county board standing or ad hoc committee open meeting or public hearing is to be posted, in its unedited form, to the county website within five (5) business days of the proceeding. This rule shall also apply to the county board of health and the county board of adjustments.

Closed session minutes are to be recorded on a separate audio track and are not to be posted to the website. They may be posted at a later date when limited access is no longer needed and in accordance with the Wisconsin Open Meetings Law.

Written minutes are intended to be a brief synopsis of the discussion with sufficient detail to provide an understanding of the topic, points of discussion, motion(s) made and action taken.

Written minutes are required to note the start and end time of the committee proceedings as well as the approximate start time of each specific agenda item to allow the public to efficiently search the audio recordings for a full audio transcript of a specific topic.

All written minutes must be approved by the respective committee at the next regularly scheduled committee meeting with all written minutes posted to the County website within five (5) business days of the date of the meeting at which the written minutes were approved. No draft meeting minutes will be allowed to be posted to the website.

The County Clerk shall keep minutes of County Board meetings and final approved minutes shall be posted within five (5) business days of approval; the Board agenda shall be kept on file with the Clerk, be posted on the county's web site and published in the proceedings of the County Board as required by law. (9/6/11)

(5) General Duties and Powers of Committees.

(a) Each standing committee shall study, conduct investigations, and make recommendations and shall perform such other duties as the County Board may from time to time direct relative to their areas of responsibility.

(b) Each standing committee shall meet as necessary with officials of the appropriate divisions, departments, boards, or commissions.

(c) Each standing committee may refer matters relating to their areas of responsibility to the County Board. In order to sign a resolution or ordinance, as a committee member, a supervisor must have been in attendance of the committee meeting at which the measure was discussed.

(d) Citizens' comments.

1. Each standing committee shall place an item on its agenda for citizens' comments and shall report to the County Board such concerns as expressed by citizens.

2. Each standing committee shall endeavor to respond to citizens' comments and inquiries when requested to by citizens.

(e) Each standing committee shall have the power to subpoena in accordance with Wisconsin State statutes.

(6) All appointments, including reappointments, to boards, commissions, or department director positions by the County Executive and/or the County Board Chairman and all approvals of division head nominees which may come before the County Board shall be referred by the Chairman of the County Board to one or more appropriate standing committees. The committee(s) shall investigate, study, and inter-view perspective appointees and nominees requiring County Board approval and shall perform such other duties as the County Board may from time to time direct relative to such reviews. The committee(s) shall interview perspective appointees and nominees with respect to their familiarity with Kenosha County; their expertise and qualifications for service on the board, commission, or position in question; their understanding of the rules of procedure and due process; and their philosophy with respect to any issue or concern which the board, commission, department, or division in question will, in all likelihood, face or be subjected to. WHEREAS, nearly 9 in 10 Wisconsin workers who would benefit from a minimum wage increase are 20 years of age or older, nearly two-thirds are women, and 234,000 Wisconsin children would see their families' income increase; and

WHEREAS, our government's role is to maintain a wage and benefit floor to guarantee all work is valued, and that no Wisconsin worker ids denied an honest day's pay for an honest day's work' and

WHEREAS, the great American middle class is not something that just happened, we built it brick by brick, and

WHEREAS, a \$10.10 minimum wage would bring our wage floor to roughly the same level as it was in the late 1960's, adjusted for inflation; and

WHEREAS, the most important thing we can do to generate shared prosperity and build an economy that works for everyone, not jus the powerful, is to create more economy boosting jobs; and

WHEREAS, a \$10.10 minimum wage would raise wages for 587,000 Wisconsin workers by \$816 million, and generate over \$500 million in additional economic activity in Wisconsin in the next three years, resulting in nearly 4,000 new jobs: and

WHEREAS, it's time Wisconsin worked again for people who work for a living;

The 2010 Initial Resolution was (i) adopted by an affirmative vote of at least three-fourths of the members-elect (as defined in Section 59.001 (2m) of the Wisconsin Statutes) of the Governing Body in accordance with Section 67.045(1)(f) of the Wisconsin Statutes, and (ii) approved and signed by the County Executive in accordance with Section 59.17(6) of the Wisconsin Statutes.

2. The County previously borrowed (i) \$1,350,000 of the maximum amount authorized by the 2010 Initial Resolution in connection with the issuance of the County's \$10,030,000 General Obligation Promissory Notes, Series 2011A, dated August 9, 2011, (ii) \$3,158,670 of the maximum amount authorized by the 2010 Initial Resolution in connection with the issuance of the County's \$15,750,000 General Obligation Promissory Notes, Series 2012B, dated July 11, 2012, and (iii) \$3,955,741 of the maximum amount authorized by the 2010 Initial Resolution in connection with the issuance of the County's \$9,765,000 General Obligation Promissory Notes, Series 2013A, dated September 10, 2013. As of the date of this resolution, \$5,635,589 of the maximum amount authorized by the 2010 Initial Resolution remains unused.

3. On November 6, 2013, the Governing Body adopted a separate initial resolution for each of the purposes and in the maximum amount authorized as set forth in paragraphs 4(a) through (d) below (collectively, the "**2013 Initial Resolutions**"). The 2013 Initial Resolutions were (i) adopted by an affirmative vote of at least three-fourths of the members-elect (as defined in Section 59.001 (2m) of the Wisconsin Statutes) of the Governing Body in accordance with Section 67.045(1)(f) of the Wisconsin Statutes, and (ii) approved and signed by the County Executive in accordance with Section 59.17(6) of the Wisconsin Statutes.

4. The County needs funds for the following purposes and in the proposed borrowing amounts set forth below (collectively, the "**Project**"):

5. On July 15, 2014, the Governing Body adopted a resolution authorizing, among other things, the purposes of the Project to be combined into a single note issue (the "Authorizing Resolution"). The Authorizing Resolution also set forth certain details relating to the \$11,925,000 General Obligation Promissory Notes, Series 2014A (the "Obligations") authorized to be issued by this resolution.

6. The Clerk of the County caused notice of the sale of the Obligations (the "**Notice to Bidders**") to be given to media typically monitored by potential bidders in the manner and form directed by the Authorizing Resolution. The Notice to Bidders is made of record in these proceedings, and the Governing Body ratifies the Notice to Bidders.

7. In accordance with the Notice to Bidders and the bidding terms that were included in the document that was used for offering the Obligations for sale by competitive bid (the "**Notice** of **Sale**"), written bids for the sale of the Obligations were received and delivered to the Governing Body.

8. The Governing Body has considered all the bids it received. The Governing Body has decided to accept the bid of _______, or a group that it represents (the "**Purchaser**"), to purchase the Obligations specified in the Purchaser's bid. The Purchaser bid the price of \$______ for the entire issue of Obligations (the "**Purchase Price**"), plus any accrued interest, and specified that the Obligations maturing on September 1 in the years shown below will bear interest at the respective interest rates shown below:

9. The Purchaser's bid complies with all terms of the Notice to Bidders and the Notice of Sale.

10. The County has taken all actions required by law and has the power to sell and issue the Obligations.

11. The Governing Body is adopting this resolution to sell the Obligations and provide for their issuance upon the terms and conditions set forth in this resolution.

RESOLUTIONS

The Governing Body resolves as follows:

Section 1. Definitions.

In addition to the terms defined in the recitals to this resolution, the following capitalized terms have the meanings given in this section, unless the context clearly requires another meaning.

"Book-Entry System" means a system in which no physical distribution of certificates representing ownership of the Obligations is made to the owners of the Obligations but instead all outstanding Obligations are registered in the name of a securities depository appointed by the County, or in the name of such depository's nominee, and the depository and its participants record beneficial ownership and effect transfers of the Obligations electronically.

"Code" means the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended.

"**Continuing Disclosure Agreement**" means the Continuing Disclosure Agreement, dated as of the Original Issue Date, to be executed by the County and delivered on the closing date of the Obligations.

"**Debt Service Fund**" means the fund created by the County pursuant to Section 67.11 of the Wisconsin Statutes to provide for the payment of debt service on its general obligations.

"Depository" means DTC or any successor appointed by the County and acting as securities depository for the Obligations.

"DTC" means The Depository Trust Company.

"Financial Officer" means the County Treasurer.

"**Fiscal Agent**" means the Treasurer, or any successor fiscal agent appointed by the County to act as paying agent and registrar for the Obligations pursuant to Section 67.10 (2) of the Wisconsin Statutes. "**Governing Body**" means the County Board of Supervisors.

"Initial Resolution" means collectively, the 2010 Initial Resolution and the 2013 Initial Resolutions, each having the meaning set forth in the recitals to this resolution.

"County" means Kenosha County, Wisconsin.

"Municipal Officers" means the County Board Chairperson and the County Clerk. These are the officers required by law to execute general obligations on the County's behalf.

"Notice of Sale" has the meaning set forth in the recitals to this resolution.

"Obligations" means the \$11,925,000 Kenosha County, Wisconsin General Obligation Promissory Notes, Series 2014A, which will be issued pursuant to this resolution.

"Original Issue Date" means September 10, 2014.

"**Project**" has the meaning given in the recitals to this resolution.

"Purchase Price" has the meaning given in the recitals to this resolution.

"Purchaser" has the meaning given in the recitals to this resolution.

"**Record Date**" means the 15th day (whether or not a business day) of the calendar month just before a regularly scheduled interest payment date for the Obligations.

"Recording Officer" means the County Clerk.

"**Register**" means the register maintained by the Fiscal Agent at its designated office, in which the Fiscal Agent records:

(i) The name and address of the owner of each Obligation.

(ii) All transfers of each Obligation.

"Treasurer" means the County Treasurer.

Section 2. Exhibits.

The attached exhibits are also a part of this resolution as though they were fully written out in this resolution:

(i) **Exhibit A** — Form of Obligation.

(ii) Exhibit B — Notice to Electors of Sale.

Section 3. Purposes of Borrowing; Issuance of Obligations.

The Governing Body authorizes the Obligations and orders that they be prepared, executed, and issued. The Obligations will be fully registered, negotiable, general obligation promissory notes of the County in the principal amount of \$11,925,000. The Obligations will be issued pursuant to the provisions of Section 67.12(12) of the Wisconsin Statutes to pay the costs of the Project and certain expenses of issuing the Obligations (including printing costs and fees for financial consultants, bond counsel, fiscal agent, rating agencies, insurance, and registration, as applicable).

Section 4. Terms of Obligations.

The Obligations will be named "Kenosha County, Wisconsin General Obligation Promissory Notes, Series 2014A." The Obligations will be dated the Original Issue Date, even if they are actually issued or executed on another date. Each Obligation will also be dated the date on which it is authenticated by the Fiscal Agent. That date is its registration date.

The face amount of each Obligation will be \$5,000 or any multiple thereof up to the principal amount authorized for that maturity.

The Obligations will bear interest from the Original Issue Date. Interest will be payable semiannually on each March 1 and September 1, beginning on March 1, 2015, until the principal of the Obligations has been paid. Interest on each Obligation will be (i) computed on the basis of a 360-day year of twelve 30-day months and (ii) payable to the person in whose name the Obligation is registered on the Register at the end of the day on the applicable Record Date. The Obligations will be numbered consecutively as may be required to comply with any applicable rules or customs or as determined by the Municipal Officers executing the Obligations. The County and the Fiscal Agent may treat the entity or person in whose name any Obligation is registered on the Register as the absolute owner of the Obligations for all purposes whatsoever under this resolution. The following table shows when the Obligations will mature and the rate of interest each maturity will bear:

The principal of, and interest on, the Obligations will be payable in lawful money of the United States of America.

Section 5. Fiscal Agent.

The County appoints the Fiscal Agent to act as paying agent and registrar for the Obligations. Among other things, the Fiscal Agent shall maintain the Register.

Section 6. Appointment of Depository.

The County appoints DTC to act as securities depository for the Obligations. An authorized representative of the County has previously executed a blanket issuer letter of representations with DTC on the County's behalf, and the County ratifies and approves that document.

Section 7. Book-Entry System.

On the date of their initial delivery, the Obligations will be registered in the name of DTC or its nominee and maintained in a Book-Entry System. If the County's relationship with DTC is terminated, then the County may appoint another securities depository to maintain the Book-Entry System.

The County may decide at any time not to maintain the Obligations in a Book-Entry System. If the County decides not to maintain a Book-Entry System, then it will do the following:

- At its expense, the County will prepare, authenticate, and deliver to the beneficial owners of the Obligations fully-registered, certificated Obligations in the denomination of \$5,000 or any multiple thereof in the aggregate principal amount then outstanding. The beneficial owners will be those shown on the records of the Depository and its direct and indirect participants.
- (ii) The County will appoint a fiscal agent to act as paying agent and registrar for the Obligations under Section 67.10 (2) of the Wisconsin Statutes.

Section 8. Redemption.

The Obligations maturing on and after September 1, 2023 are subject to redemption before their stated maturity dates, at the County's option, in whole or in part, in the order of maturity selected by the County, on September 1, 2022 and on any date thereafter. The redemption price will be 100% of the principal amount redeemed, plus accrued interest to the redemption date, and no premium will be paid. If payment of an Obligation called for redemption has been made or provided for, then interest on the Obligation stops accruing on the stated redemption date. If less than all the principal amount of a specific maturity is redeemed, then the Obligations will be redeemed in \$5,000 multiples in accordance with Sections 9 and 10 hereof.

Section 9. Manner of Payment/Transfers/Redemption Notices Under Book-Entry System.

So long as the County maintains the Obligations in a Book-Entry System, the following provisions apply: *Payment.* The Fiscal Agent is directed to pay the principal of, and interest on, the Obligations by wire transfer to the Depository or its nominee in accordance with the Depository's rules that are then in effect. *Transfers.* The Obligations are transferable, only upon the Register and only if the Depository ceases to act as securities depository for the Obligations and the County appoints a successor securities depository. If that happens, then upon the surrender of the Obligations to the Fiscal Agent, the County will issue new fully registered Obligations in the same aggregate principal amounts to the successor securities depository, and the Obligations will be recorded as transferred to the successor securities depository in the Register.

The Fiscal Agent will not be required to make any transfer of the Obligations (i) during the 15 calendar days before the date of the sending of notice of any proposed redemption of the Obligations, or (ii) with respect to any particular Obligation, after such Obligation has been called for redemption.

Partial Redemption. If less than all the principal amount of a specific maturity is to be redeemed, then the Depository and its direct and indirect participants will select the beneficial owners of the Obligations to be redeemed. If an Obligation has been called for redemption but less than all the principal amount of a specific maturity is redeemed, then on the redemption date and upon surrender to the Fiscal Agent of the Obligation, the County will issue one or more new Obligations in the principal amount outstanding after the redemption.

Notice of Redemption. Notice of the redemption of any of the Obligations will be sent to the Depository, in the manner required by the Depository, not less than 30, and not more than 60, days prior to the proposed redemption date. A notice of redemption may be revoked by sending notice to the Depository, in the manner required by the Depository, not less than 15 days prior to the proposed redemption date.

Section 10. Manner of Payment/Transfers/Redemption Notices *Not* Under Book-Entry System.

If at any time the County decides *not* to maintain the Obligations in a Book-Entry System, then the following provisions apply:

Payment. The Fiscal Agent will pay the principal of each Obligation upon its presentation and surrender on or after its maturity or earlier redemption date at the designated office of the Fiscal Agent, and the Fiscal Agent will pay, on each interest payment date, the interest on each Obligation by wire or other electronic

transfer or by check of the Fiscal Agent sent by first class mail to the person in whose name the Obligation is registered on the Register at the end of the day on the applicable Record Date.

Transfers. Each Obligation is transferable, only upon the Register, for a like aggregate principal amount of the same maturity and interest rate in denominations of \$5,000. A transfer may be requested by the registered owner in person or by a person with a written power of attorney. The Obligation shall be surrendered to the Fiscal Agent, together with a written instrument of transfer satisfactory to the Fiscal Agent signed by the registered owner or by the person with the written power of attorney. The County will issue one or more new fully registered Obligations in the same aggregate principal amount to the transferee or transferees, as applicable, in exchange for the surrendered Obligations and upon the payment of a charge sufficient to reimburse the County or the Fiscal Agent for any tax, fee, or other governmental charge required to be paid with respect to such registration.

The Fiscal Agent will not be required to make any transfer of the Obligations (i) during the 15 calendar day period before the date of the sending of notice of any proposed redemption of the Obligations, or (ii) with respect to any particular Obligation, after the Obligation has been called for redemption.

Partial Redemptions. If less than all the principal amount of a specific maturity is to be redeemed, then the County or the Fiscal Agent will randomly select the Obligations to be redeemed. If less than the entire principal amount of a particular Obligation has been called for redemption, then upon surrender to the Fiscal Agent of the Obligation to be redeemed, the County will issue one or more new Obligations in the principal amount outstanding after the redemption.

Notice of Redemption. Notice of the redemption of any of the Obligations shall be sent by first class mail, not less than 30, and not more than 60, days before the redemption date to the registered owners of the Obligations to be redeemed at the addresses set forth in the Register. A notice of redemption may be revoked by sending a notice, by first class mail, not less than 15 days prior to the proposed redemption date to the registered owners of the Obligations which have been called for redemption.

Section 11. Form of Obligations.

The Obligations shall be in substantially the form shown in <u>Exhibit A</u>. Omissions, insertions, or variations are permitted if they are deemed necessary or desirable and are consistent with this resolution or any supplemental resolution. The County may cause the approving opinion of bond counsel to be printed or reproduced on the Obligations.

Section 12. Execution of Obligations.

The Obligations shall be signed by the persons who are the Municipal Officers on the date on which the Obligations are signed. The Obligations shall be sealed with the County's corporate seal (or a facsimile), if the County has one, and they shall also be authenticated by the manual signature of the Fiscal Agent.

The Obligations will be valid and binding even if before they are delivered any person whose signature appears on the Obligations is no longer living or is no longer the person authorized to sign the Obligations. In that event, the Obligations will have the same effect as if the person were living or were still the person authorized to sign the Obligations.

A facsimile signature may be used as long as at least one signature of a Municipal Officer is a manual signature or the Fiscal Agent's certificate of authentication has a manual signature. If a facsimile signature is used, then it will be treated as the officer's own signature.

Section 13. Continuing Disclosure.

The appropriate officers of the County are directed to sign the Continuing Disclosure Agreement, and the County agrees to comply with all its terms.

Section 14. Sale of Obligations.

The County awards the sale of the Obligations to the Purchaser at the Purchase Price, plus any accrued interest from the Original Issue Date to the date of delivery of the Obligations. The County approves and accepts the purchase agreement, which may be in the form of a bid form, signed and presented by the Purchaser to evidence the purchase of the Obligations (the "**Purchase Agreement**"). The Municipal Officers are directed (i) to sign the Purchase Agreement in the County's name and (ii) to take any additional actions needed to complete the sale of the Obligations, including arranging for a specific date, time, and location of closing of the sale.

The Financial Officer is directed to comply with the terms of the Notice of Sale with respect to any good-faith deposit requirements.

The officers of the County are directed to sign the Obligations and to arrange for delivery of the Obligations to the Purchaser through the facilities of DTC in accordance with the Notice of Sale, the Purchase Agreement, and this resolution. The Obligations may be delivered to the Purchaser upon payment by the Purchaser of the Purchase Price, plus any accrued interest, as required by the Notice of Sale.

Unless waived by the Purchaser, the delivery of the Obligations is conditioned upon the County furnishing the following items to the Purchaser:

(i) The Obligations, together with the written, unqualified approving opinion of the law firm of Foley & Lardner LLP, bond counsel, evidencing the legality of

the Obligations and that interest on the Obligations will be excluded from gross income for federal income tax purposes.

- (ii) A transcript of the proceedings relating to the issuance of the Obligations.
- (iii) A certificate showing that no litigation has been threatened or is pending that would affect the legality of the Obligations or the right of the County to issue them at the time of their delivery.

Section 15. General Obligation Pledge; Tax Levy.

For the prompt payment of the principal of, and interest on, the Obligations, the County irrevocably pledges its full faith and credit. The County hereby levies upon all taxable property in its territory a direct, annual, and irrepealable tax in an amount sufficient to pay, and for the express purpose of paying, the interest on the Obligations as it falls due and also to pay and discharge the principal of the Obligations on their maturity dates.

This tax shall be carried from year to year into the County's tax roll. It shall be collected in addition to all other taxes and in the same manner and at the same time as all other taxes. The amount of this tax that is carried into the County's tax roll may be reduced in any year by the amount of any surplus money in the account within the Debt Service Fund (as described below) available to pay debt service on the Obligations for such year. This tax for each year the levy is made will be in the following amounts:

Section 16. Debt Service Fund.

The Treasurer is directed to keep the proceeds of the taxes levied under this resolution, when they are collected, in the Debt Service Fund. The Debt Service Fund shall be maintained and administered as provided in Section 67.11 of the Wisconsin Statutes. The County shall create a separate account within the Debt Service Fund solely for the Obligations. Any accrued interest received on the date of delivery of the Obligations and the premium, if any, paid to the County by the Purchaser in excess of the stated principal amount of the Obligations shall be deposited into the Debt Service Fund and used to pay interest on the Obligations. If the money in the Debt Service Fund is insufficient to make a payment of principal of, or interest on, the Obligations on a date on which such a payment is due, then the County will promptly provide the necessary funds to make the payment from other available sources.

Section 17. Borrowed Money Fund.

The sale proceeds of the Obligations (not including any accrued interest or premium received) shall be deposited in and kept by the Treasurer in a separate fund. The fund shall be designated with both the name of the Obligations and the name Borrowed Money Fund (herein referred to as the "**Borrowed Money Fund**"). Money in the Borrowed Money Fund, including any earnings, shall be (a) used to pay the costs of the Project and issuing the Obligations, or (b) transferred to the Debt Service Fund as provided by law.

Section 18. Official Statement.

The County approves and ratifies the preliminary offering document prepared and distributed in connection with the sale of the Obligations, and the County authorizes and approves the final version of such document (the "Official Statement") to be prepared prior to the issuance of the Obligations; *provided, however*, that the Official Statement shall be substantially in the form submitted to this meeting, with such modifications as the Municipal Officers approve. The Municipal Officers are directed to deliver copies of the Official Statement to the Purchaser and, if the Purchaser requests, execute one or more copies on behalf of the County. Execution and delivery of the Official Statement will conclusively evidence the approval of the Municipal Officers.

Section 19. Publication of Notice.

The Recording Officer is directed to publish notice that the County has agreed to sell the Obligations. The notice shall be published in the County's official newspaper as a class 1 notice under Chapter 985 of the Wisconsin Statutes promptly after the adoption of this resolution. The notice shall be in substantially the form shown in <u>Exhibit B</u>. The Recording Officer shall obtain proof, in affidavit form, of the publication, and

shall compare the notice as published with the attached form to make sure that no mistake was made in publication.

Section 20. Authorization of Officers.

The appropriate officers of the County are directed to prepare and furnish the following items to the Purchaser and the attorneys approving the legality of the Obligations:

- (i) Certified copies of proceedings and records of the County relating to the Obligations and to the financial condition and affairs of the County.
- (ii) Other affidavits, certificates, and information that may be required to show the facts about the legality of the Obligations, as such facts appear on the books and records under the officer's custody or control or as are otherwise known to the officer.

All certified copies, affidavits, certificates, and information furnished for such purpose will be representations of the County as to the facts they present.

Section 21. Tax Law Covenants.

The County covenants that it will comply with all requirements of the Code and the Treasury Regulations promulgated thereunder, that shall be satisfied so that interest on the Obligations will be excluded from gross income for federal income tax purposes.

Section 22. Further Authorization.

The County authorizes its officers, attorneys, and other agents or employees to do all acts required of them to carry out the purposes of this resolution.

Section 23. Conflict with Prior Acts.

In case any part of a prior action of the Governing Body conflicts with this resolution, that part of the prior action is hereby rescinded.

Section 24. Severability of Invalid Provisions.

If a court holds any provision of this resolution to be illegal or invalid, then the illegality or invalidity shall not affect any other provision of this resolution.

Section 25. Effective Date.

This resolution takes effect upon its adoption and approval in the manner provided by law.

CITIZEN COMMENTS

Ken Muehlbauer, 9128 Prairie Village Dr., stated he had some issues with the 2015 Budget and asked the board to give some additional consideration to the following. Recently the board passed a revised Debt Management Policy. On pg 6 of the policy it states; the term of any debt obligation issued by the county should not exceed the economic life of the improvements they finance. He feels there are assets being financed in the 2015 budget on 10 year bonds that are in violation of this policy. He also spoke of the miscellaneous projects.

Donna Zarovy, 6207 203rd Ave., stated she is an employee of Kenosha County and a proud member of Local 990. She stated that the new pay schedule starting in January will negatively affect many employees financially. She feels a change like this requires more notice so employees can better plan for it. She spoke of how since Act 10 her wages decreased by \$310 per pay period, or \$8,000 per year which is a 17% decrease. Kenosha County classified employees have only received a 25 cent raise since 2010. It seems the Kenosha County Board no longer wants good hard working employees, but rather contracted employees who would not be as dedicated or as cost effective as they are.

Kathy Million, 11820 26th Ave., stated she is President of Local 1392 at Brookside Care Center. She spoke of wages and health benefits. Brookside employees are the lowest paid county employees with the average CNA making \$25,000 per year or \$11 - \$12 per hour. Since 2012 they were mandated by law to pay 7% of their wages into their pension, private sector is not. That combined with insurance premiums is 30% right off their paycheck or \$4 per hour in take home pay. They have only gotten a 25 cent raise since 2010; they can't take any more hits. She also spoke in favor of the Brookside renovation and expansion project.

Diana Christofferson, 5121 294th Ave., state she is the Admissions and Marketing Coordinator at Brookside Care Center. She spoke tonight, not as an employee but rather as the daughter of a short term rehab resident and daughter-in-law of a long term care resident of Brookside. She has first had knowledge of the outstanding staff at Brookside. She spoke in favor of the Brookside project and encouraged the board to vote in favor of it as well.

Dana Osinga, 6734 27th Ave., stated she is a Kenosha County Brookside employee and a Kenosha County tax payer. She spoke of Brookside being the Best of Kenosha three years in a row and how Brookside is nationally recognized as being one of the best nursing homes. It's because of commitment, investment and passion. Not investment in dollars, but investment of the heart. Also the commitment of the staff members giving more of themselves and providing the greatest care possible. Kenosha doesn't need another privately owned nursing home or rehabilitation center; Kenosha needs Brookside. She asked for the boards support for Brookside.

Nanette Shumway, 5901 1st Pl., stated she is a county employee and has worked for the county for about 6 months. She feels there are some misconceptions related to how the Kenosha County employees are compensated compared to those in the private sector. She admitted that until she started working for the county she had the same misconceptions and can honestly say this is not so. Currently she is making just over \$40,000 which is 27% less than she made in the private sector. Her county position has greater responsibilities and challenges than her private sector position. She also paid less for her health coverage in the private sector and had better coverage. If the county would like to attract good employees and retain them, the county will have to become more competitive with the private sector otherwise the good employees will get the experience they need and move on. This will cost the county more in training and will lose quality work. She reminded the board that the choices they make now will affect the county in the long run.

Pamela Maloney 3104 14th Ln., stated she is a tax payer and an employee of Kenosha County for 16 $\frac{1}{2}$ years. She asked that the time be extended for the payroll change as this will cause a major hardship on her and many other employees if this is done at the beginning of the year. According to the American Institute of Research, the cost of living between 2004 and 2014 has increased 23%-26%. Things such as

gas have increase 59% since 2005. In the past 10 years, her hourly wage has increased by 13.8%. Paying premiums for health, dental and vision and paying into the Wisconsin State Retirement her income decreased by 9% leaving the net increase in pay over the past decade of 4.8%. She hopes the board takes this into consideration when voting on the 2015 budget.

Chairman Kubicki called on Vice-Chair Breunig. She thanked the employees who contacted her with their concerns regarding the payroll schedule change. She announced that it has been worked out and if approved the following night the new pay schedule will begin in April.

At this time, Supervisor Rose presented the 2015 Kenosha County Budget.
