CITIZEN COMMENTS - 7:31 PM*

Dennis Hughes144 N Jefferson St., Milwaukee, stated he is the Staff Representative for AFSCME, Local 990. He spoke regarding a decision the Finance/Administration Committee made upholding the decision made by an Impartial Hearing Officer (IHO) regarding a Kenosha County Correctional Officer. He stated the IHO decision should be rejected because it violates public policy by prohibiting employees from the quiet enjoyment of their non-work time and discourages employees from their basic right to education and because it was written by an IHO who was not impartial. The disciplinary decision was based on incomplete medical information, the improper role of the Personnel Director and inadequate disciplinary investigation. He stated she is entitled to a decision by the full County Board and that all employees deserve a disciplinary process that is fair and impartial. Without immediate action by the board, AFSCME intends to pursue actions necessary to force the county's compliance.

At this time Chairman Kubicki presented Dr. Thompson and Rebecca Stevens the National Mentoring Month Proclamation.

Chairman Kubicki welcomed Youth In Governance member Ashley Dabbs who is in attendance at the meeting. A vote was taken to approve the change of order of the resolutions and ordinances on the agenda due to items from the Planning, Development and Extension Education Committee. The vote in favor of this change was unanimous.

SUPERVISOR REPORTS - 7:39 PM*

Supervisor Elverman stated the Public Works/Facilities Committee is changing their February 1st meeting to February 8th. Milwaukee Public Television, Around the Corner with John McGivern is doing a show called "Westosha". They will be having an advanced screening at Wilmot High School on February 1st which they will be at so their meeting changed to February 8th. Petrifying Springs Parks was closed this past week due to the emerald ash borer removal and should open by the first week of February.

Supervisor Hallmon stated LaVerne Jaros, the head of the Aging and Disability Division gave the Human Services Committee a brief update on the Mental Health Study, this study should be ready for release soon. They also received an update from Doug Bartz, Job Center Manager, he reported the unemployment rate in Kenosha County is under 5%.

Supervisor Rose stated the Finance/Administration Committee met and did unanimously uphold the decision of the hearing officer regarding an employee grievance. Those in attendance at the meeting were Supervisors Rose, O'Day, Kohlmeier, Gentz, and R. Frederick. It is his opinion, they were in full compliance with the law, our statutes and rules this board adopted approximately 4-5 years ago regarding employee grievances. When two employees from Brookside were reinstated following these same procedures, he didn't hear any complaints then. He also stated the Director of Finance reported to their committee the general fund will have a surplus/increase of \$1,048,000 and the unassigned reserves as a percentage of the general fund will end at 25%. This is in conformity in what has been observed as AAA rating in those communities that do have AAA ratings. It is their goal to achieve that rating.

Supervisor A. Johnson stated she agrees with much of what Supervisor Rose said regarding the action taken by Finance/Administration Committee with regards to the employee discipline. She agrees completely they have defined their process in the way they conduct closed session hearings for personal issues. She respects the job Corporation Counsel and Bob Riedl does but stated they all questioned the grievance

procedure when looking at the Deputy Clerk debacle that happened during the wage study. They all agreed the process was lacking. She would request that Supervisor Rose and Finance/Administration Committee take a look at that policy and insure that they are doing what is fair to the employees during the grievance process. This in no way reflects on Mr. Riedl; it's the policy.

Supervisor Breunig confirmed the date for the next Public Works/Facilities meeting being changed due to the Around the Corner Westosha Report show being previewed on February 1st.

Supervisor Rose asked that they resist the temptation to reopen the whole issue on rules with respect to disciplinary matters. They have already spent a lot of time in the past on this issue.

The irrigation on the Blue Spruce course at Brighton Dale came in \$100,000 lower, while the Brookside bids came in almost 7% higher than anticipated. They have been working on value engineering trying to get back in budget which has been accomplished. The project is back on budget with the same operation and the facility being built. Everything is on schedule for an early April start. The pretrial building has some surface cracks. The building was inspected and is sound and will be repaired with caulking and crack filling. The Highway Dept. roof will be repaired during the spring/summer.

Supervisor Decker stated the Planning Development and Extension Education Committee passed the Conditional Use Permit for County Thunder. There were 172 nominations for the Youth In Governance and applications were mailed out.

Supervisor B. Frederick stated the County Association has numerous dealing with county issues including zoning and other requirements we may have to face. He will bring a full report to the board when the session ends.

Supervisor Gentz stated the Joint Service Public Safety software go live date is extended for 3 months due to a slight scheduling delay.

Supervisor Esposito reported on the 2015 Federal Inmate Detainee Housing revenue. 199 per day was allowed in the budget; actual count was 198.4. This year in January the numbers have been 230/240 per day.

CITIZEN COMMENTS

Debra Shimkus, 11008 67th PI. thanked the board for the anticipated passing of the Resolution regarding the Corrections Officers Classification and Compensation Study. While she applauds the pay raise, she questions if any of the COs will see one. She asked if the raises are based on performance reviews. They have gone this route before with no one receiving an increase. They all can't lack in their job duties. She also spoke of the 8 paid holidays and the short weeks. They have to work overtime to make an 80 hr. pay period. This takes its toll on the employee and their families. Act 10 took away their right to bargain. All public safely officers put themselves at risk for the betterment of the community.

Dan Campion, 11303 232nd Ave., stated he is a supervisor on the Salem Town Board. He updated the board on the discussions they're having in regards to the Village of Silver Lake. They will be having public information meetings on June 16th and 21st. He hopes to see supervisors there.

Denise Bell, 4223 39th Ave., explained the differences between the different departments as far as holiday pay goes. She feels the Jail staff is being discriminated against. The primary responsibility of a Sheriff is to run the county jail, yet the largest entity under his command is discriminated against.

Carlos Gerena, 7312 98th Ave., stated there are Correction Officers who are actively seeking other job opportunities or using this position as a stepping stone to get on the road as law enforcement. They feel they are being deceived and do not have faith in the supervision and administration. The fact that the leadership is unwilling to treat them fairly adds up to negativity. Why would employees of any caliber choose to stay with any job that they feel exhibits poor leadership and leaves them feeling underappreciated alongside being under compensated. All they want is equality and to be treated fairly and with the respect they deserve.

Lynley Kapellusch, 4208 Washington Rd., stated she works as an Admission Release Specialist. They, just like the COs work a 5-2, 4-2 schedule. It takes 3 months to get to their weekends and that is also their short week. To get to a full pay check they have to work on their day off and take away the weekend with their family that took them 3 months to get to. They didn't ask for this schedule that created these short weeks. Morale is horrible and unless something changes, the county is going to lose some really good workers.

Matt Flynn, 7945 18th Ave., stated he is the owner of Sophisticatering. He wanted to know if the board was aware of the issues they're having with Kemper Center. On May 17th they had a meeting with the County Executive and have not heard one word back on it. He wants to know if their contract with Kemper Center is valid; he was told it was not. He doesn't know what to tell their clients. He suggested the board look into what is going on at Kemper Center.

Evan Burns, 3710 10th Ave., stated that mistreatment of female employees and discrimination against vendors has been common practice at the Kemper Center and that the county board should reconsider its relationship with the Kemper Center. He also spoke of the poor conditions of the building.

Lois Bruno, 4995 89th Pl., said she was employed by Kemper Center for ten weeks before being terminated. She stated she was fired from her job at the Kemper Center because she stood up for a female employee whom she said had been humiliated by the center's director. She also said she had to buy her own cleaning supplies and had no heat in her work area in October.

Annette Flynn, 7945 18th Ave., stated she had researched a recent event at Kemper Center and it was a social media event created on Facebook and party goers were charged \$25 admission to attend. There are videos out there showing pans of food thrown among other things. She would like answers as to why a property like this is booking events like this.

Dayvin Hallmon, 1341 57th St., stated last week's events in Orlando has our nation and community in tragedy, confusion and minor paranoia along with other events in the recent past. He addressed things we can do locally to subvert similar situations. As local policy makers, they can help reduce and relieve the suffering he spoke of. He believes in terms of preventing these kinds of tragedies, it is in our best interest to look at the HRC Municipal Equality Index as well as Campaign Zero

Matt Flynn, 7945 18th Ave., stated he is the owner of Sophisticatering and would like to know if their contract is valid or not. They contacted the County Executive's office in early March regarding additional fees being charged to their clients for using them instead of another caterer. Since then other clients have been told by Kemper Center staff that their services were not available to them. They now have the task to inform their customers that have secured their services that their efforts have failed to get answers to their questions.

Annette Flynn, 7945 18th Ave., questioned what money that was borrowed to Kemper Center by Kenosha County was used for. She does not believe that it was used for what it was intended for. She also spoke of the "whistle blowing policy". She requests an FBI investigation into Kemper Center Inc. and Kemper Center Foundation Inc. including questioning current and past employees. She also requests a forensic audit on Kemper Center Inc. and Kemper Center Foundation Inc. and a report back to the County Board within the next 60 days of the findings of these two requests.

Adell Frye, 1433 28th Ct. stated she is one of the 11 employees let go from the Community Health Center on May 31st. The last few years' employees have hit road blocks trying to get accountability for the Executive Director of the Kenosha Community Health Center. Anytime they would get someone to listen, the Director would retain an attorney and the employees would get emails threating their jobs. The patients have limited resources which were already limited and becoming even more limited.

ANNOUNCEMENTS OF THE CHAIRWOMAN

Chairwoman Breunig stated the overflow of jurors for the Obregon trial will be held in the County Board Chambers on Monday. Any items on the desks should be removed if possible. Budget hearings will be October 24-27. She expects supervisors to try to make it as much as possible especially new supervisors. This will be very beneficial to ask questions and listen to what is going on in all of the committees to help get through the budget process. Land and Water Conservation is looking for a couple of people to sit on their committee. Anyone interested can send Chairwoman Breunig their application.

SUPERVISOR REPORTS

Supervisor Rose stated on the desks is the 2015 audit for review which was presented to the Finance Committee at their last meeting. In the report is what CPAs call a "clean opinion", in other words there were no problems with it. The unrestricted fund balance or the general fund has increased from \$15,080,000 in 2014 to 18,210,000. Historically in 2009 the balance was 5.9 million. The long term obligation debt, employee benefit and vacation accruals has decreased from \$216,000,000 in 2008 to \$191,000,000 in 2015. That's a \$25,000,000 decrease. Golf course revenue has increased to all time high of \$23,000. The county received \$25,000,000 federal grants, and \$20,000,000 state grants which have been administered with their specifications.

Supervisor Gentz updated the board on the Joint Services budget. Tentatively they are coming in at 2.65. One of the main things is the compensation study they will do. Both entities recommend 3% be put into a fund for the expected outcome of the study. They are also anticipating 5% increase in insurance.

Supervisor Hallmon stated he attended the National Association of Counties (NACo) Annual Conference in Long Beach CA late July. He attended the Transportation Steering Committee which conversations included exploding rail cars, the difficulty funding roads and the situation on funding the transportation system at both the state and federal levels. They have reached such a critical point that engineers are putting cloth or some sort of netting to catch falling pieces of bridges that are still operating and functioning as bridges. He attended a work shop on solar energy. The price of solar has dropped 43% since 2010. He spoke of what Arts and Cultural can do for local government and stated he removed himself from the Transportation Steering Committee and asked to be assigned to the Arts and Cultural Commission as well as the Technology Steering Committee.

Supervisor O'Day stated the History Center will be having their 12th Annual Chili Cook-off on October 15th. This is their biggest fund raiser of the year and hopes everyone can make it.

Supervisor B. Frederick stated Senator Bob Wirch spoke at the Legislative Committee meeting on local government control and what has been done in Madison dealing with roads and how they might be paid for over the long term. Senator Wanggaard will speak on the same subjects in November.

Supervisor Elverman stated the Public Works/Facilities Committee will be touring the site at Brookside on Thursday at 4:30. Anyone interested is invited to join them. There were no bids for the Public Safety Building generator. The reason being the electrical contractors did not get bids from the generator

companies because they were too busy because of the wild fires and floods. It will be re-bid and the bids will be due on October 4th. Golf Courses are doing fantastic, better than last year. The Summer Youth Program ended on August 11th. It was very successful; a lot of projects were done. Not only are the youth learning work ethics & how to work in a group, things are getting done when they normally wouldn't have been done.

Supervisor Blough stated Captain Weyker presented a verbal and video presentation at the Judiciary & Law Committee on Country Thunder. \$225,000 bond was posted and from that \$140,000 was used for security, and \$30,000 for the Highway Department. The surplus will be refunded to County Thunder. There were 255 ordinances issued, and 29 state charges. If anyone wants more details the meeting minutes are available on the Judiciary and Law Committee site.

Jack Rose, 4315 68th St. stated NAMI's mission in Kenosha is to improve the quality of life for folks affected with mental illness by education, support and advocacy. He thanked the board for their past support. There is a great opportunity with the County Executive's 2017 budget to do even more. The expanding of the Care Center is fantastic. The Care Center is a jewel in the battle against mental illness. With the recent pilot program with Kenosha Human Development Services and Kenosha Police the crisis people are using a 3rd site to check on people who may be in mental health crisis. Diversion from in-patient care works especially if it's not warranted. Expanding the hours at Bridges Community Center will be extremely helpful to the folks living with mental illness. The role of the Vivitrol program has been exceedingly important. Many times a person living with a mental illness is also an addict. We need more proactive diversion programs which cost up to \$22 per day compared to about \$76 per day for jail. He asked for the boards continued help during the budget process.

Virginia Hoekstra, 6209 75th St, stated she has been an advocate for the Shalom homeless shelter. She has not been able to get the city to move on anything. An alderman explained to her that the city only has so much to give. She said she has found out the county is actually the one responsible for the homeless shelter. So she feels the county should use some of the federal money given to them for health to go towards the homeless shelter.

Bob Waldron, 25910 103rd St., stated over the past year there has been a lot of fanfare over the newly acquired facility for the Shalom Center, but the facility is not scheduled to be activated for another year or so. Even then, the entrance requirements will remain the same as they are now. He is not against keeping the "rough" characters, or the mentally handicapped individuals away from women, children or other vulnerable individuals. These individuals have difficulty finding shelter. The city has created a committee which addresses some of these issues and he thanked Supervisor Bostrom for serving on this committee.

She was hired to make money for Kemper and she finds opening up the venue to different caterers has helped them in the long run. All a caterer needs are a license and insurance to work at Kemper Center. Her main focus is what the clients want.

Kari Turco, 5315 43rd St. stated she is the bookkeeper at Kemper Center. She has been mandated to implement cost saving options on many things. She has started re-negotiating service contracts. It became clear to her the many volunteers at Kemper Center and Anderson Arts Center do it because they love it and are dedicated to keeping it open and running. She has many ideas including fund raisers she has presented to the board. She can be counted on being conscientious and frugal and a good steward of the operating of the money the county allows to them.
