COMMON NAME	DESCRIPTION AND CHARACTERISTICS	
AMERICAN ARBORVITAE	Very dark green color year-round. Medium growth rate and very hardy. Used for screening and foundation planting. When young it grows bushy but when it gets to 3-4 feet it grows more pyramidal. Does well in full sun to partial shade and can grow in a variety of soil conditions.	
BLACK CHOKEBERRY	Black chokeberry is a deciduous, cold-hardy shrub, showing white flowers in the spring and colorful red foliage and heavy, dark fruit in the fall. Tolerates partial shade but thrives in full sun. It is also an excellent choice for those tough, low-lying wet areas, yet it can acclimate itself to dry locations as well. It reaches 4–8 feet in height. Black chokeberry provides browse for white-tailed deer and rabbits, and fruits for ruffed grouse.	
BURR OAK	The Burr Oak (<i>Quercus macrocarpa</i>) is a very long-lived though slow growing tree that grows to a height of 70-80 feet with a spread of about 80 feet at maturity. Prefers locations where it receives full sun and tolerates a variety of soil and moisture conditions. Yields large acorns with a distinctive fringed cap providing a food source for a variety of wildlife.	
COMMON LILAC	The Common Lilac is noted for its showy, fragrant blooms in late spring. Flowers come in many colors ranging from white, pink, blue, lavender to reddish-purple, clusters of flowers sit against dark green, heart shaped leaves. Grows best in well drained, fertile soils, under full sunlight.	
CONCOLOR FIR	Concolor fir (also known as white fir) is a fairly slow-growing, drought-resistant tree. It does best in deep, rich and well-drained soils. Avoid heavy clay and wet spots, such as near over-irrigated lawns. Concolor fir is tolerant of some shade, although it prefers full sun, and is hardy in zones 3-7.	
HAZELNUT	A large fast-growing shrub with showy spring flowers. The Hazelnut can grow to 8-12' tall with a crown spread of 10', creating a dense privacy screen, perfect for a hedgerow and as nesting sites for birds. Nuts are a valuable food source for wildlife eaten by turkey, ruffed grouse, and pheasants.	
NINEBARK	Ninebark is a cold hardy, tough, native shrub. Pinkish-white flower clusters in late spring, persistent seed capsules and exfoliating bark adds to the seasonal interest. An upright, spreading, dense shrub with arching branches reaching 6 to 10 feet tall and wide.	
NORTHERN RED OAK	One of the faster growing oak trees. Has reddish fall color and grows to a height of 60-75 feet with similar width and a broad rounded shape. Excellent for wildlife planting.	
NORWAY SPRUCE	Fastest growing of the spruces. Develops strong graceful branches that are covered with dark green needles. Ideal windbreaker. Matures at 60'; 25' spread. (zones 3-7). Grows at a medium to fast rate, with height increases of anywhere from 13" to more than 24" per year.	
RED MAPLE	Grows to a height of 40-60 feet. A rapid grower that can adapt to a wide range of soil conditions. Fall colors vary from yellow to scarlet.	
RED OSIER DOGWOOD	Grows best in moist to wet soils with full sunlight. Average height is 8' and it spreads outward to 6'. Has bright red twigs with white flowers and white berries in the summer. Leaves turn dark red in the fall. The shrub's deep red stems create a pop of color in the snowy, gray months. Fibrous root systems also provide effective erosion control on banks and slopes. Good for providing wildlife food and cover.	
RIVER BIRCH	The River Birch is generally tolerant of many soil conditions. In optimal conditions will grow to a height of 40-70 feet with a width of 40-60 feet. Has a reddish-brown exfoliating bark and is generally resistant to bronze birch borer.	
SUGAR MAPLE	Sugar Maple thrives when it is planted into rich, moderately deep soils having even moisture coupled with good drainage. Has brilliant red, orange, and yellow fall color.	
WHITE PINE	The White Pine is a large, straight-stemmed tree with a pyramidal crown. Clustered soft blue-green needles. Ideal screen or windbreak. Likes moist, well-drained soils. Grows 50' to 80' with a 20-40' spread.	
WATER GEL ONE BAG WILL TREAT ABOUT 100 TREES	Water Gel is a powder, which is mixed with water to form a gel that the roots of the seedling are dipped into. The gel acts as a water-holding medium and helps to maintain an even moisture balance around the seedling roots after planting. The gel will remain active for at least one growing season.
