County sees budget surplus

Lower insurance costs, higher Brookside revenue boost reserve funds

Record sales tax receipts and lower than expected spending programs left Kenosha County with a \$2 million budget surplus for 2012, according to data presented to a committee of the Kenosha County Board Thursday.

At a meeting of the board's finance committee, Al Swartz, assistant finance director, presented a report on how the county fared in the 2012 budget cycle. Although he said the final tally has not yet been audited and may change slightly, the county ended the year with a surplus, allowing the reserve fund to build up from \$8 million to \$10 million.

That growth in the reserve

fund brings the county into compliance with board policy, which calls for a reserve equal to at least 17 percent of general fund expenditures. David Geertsen, county finance director, said the 17 percent reserve target is based on 'best practice' guidelines, and helps secure strong bond ratings. "The last time we hit that mark was 2006," he said.

County Executive Jim Kreuser said building the surplus back to recommended levels has been one of the targets of his administration since he was first elected in 2008.

"It has been a very significant goal for us," he said, saying that changes within a number of departments have allowed the county to lower costs and improve revenues. "Change is hard, but we looked at the process, looked at best practices and made the changes."

Swartz said several factors aided in building the surplus. Health insurance expenditures came in about \$500,000 lower than expected. Geertsen said the county is self-insured, and said there were fewer large claims in 2012. Departments also held vacant positions open when possible, saving on health insurance and saving another \$299,000 in employee costs.

Another major factor, he said, was Brookside Care Center, the county-owned skilled nursing facility, posting a \$300,000 profit after increasing the number of rehabilitation patients there.

Sales taxes jumped by 2.4 percent over the previous

year to \$10.7 million, more than \$437,000 higher than the budget projection. "It is the highest sales tax total we have ever had," Swartz said. In all. 15 areas of the 2012

budget posted better than expected results. There were some higher

There were some higher than expected expenses, Swartz said. Revenue to the sheriff's department from federal inmates housed at the Kenosha County Detention Center fell \$682,000 below 2012 estimates. And demand for mental health residential treatment was higher than expected, exceeding budget estimates by \$400,000. Swartz said so far in 2013

the number of federal inmates at the detention center is meeting budget estimates.


