

Number of Youth and Cases




Demographics – 2010 Cohort


- Over one-third of the 2010 cohort was female (34%).
- Most youth in this cohort were white (54%), followed by African American (30%) and Hispanic (9%).
- Over half of the youth were less than 16 years of age at their case start date (JCIS 68%; DCFS 58%).

Most offenses committed by youth are misdemeanors and truancy.


Most Serious Offense Committed by 2010 Cohorts




Out-of-Home Placements









Diversion Rate - Juvenile Court Intake Services




Non-Recidivism Rate - Juvenile Court Services

Habitual Truant: A student who is absent from school without an acceptable excuse [s.118.16(4) and s.118.15 Wis. Stats.] for part or all of five or more days on which school is held during a semester.

Post-Supervision Court Involvement

Youth Assessment and Screening Instrument (YASI)

The Youth Assessment and Screening Instrument is an assessment tool which has been field tested and validated based on empirical research.


Determines level of risk youth presents to commit further delinquent acts, identifies protective factors to build upon, and identifies dynamic risk factors that can be targeted for services.

The YASI is currently being used in many places including:

- >State of New York
- > California Division of Juvenile Justice
- **→** State of Illinois
- > Province of Alberta Canada
- > Youth Custodial Services in Scotland
- ➤ Kenosha County since March of 2010

Summer Youth Employment Program

- A total of 214 youth participated in the Summer Youth Employment Program
- There were **49** different job types (e.g., video editing, landscaping, clerical support, street maintenance, office receptionist)
- There were a total of 39 different job sites throughout Kenosha County
- 23,000 work hours were completed by participants
- 11 youth obtained unsubsidized employment
- A total of 113 in-school participants received 1/2 credit towards graduation from the Kenosha Unified School District

Who are Crossover Youth?

Crossover Youth

Youths who have experienced maltreatment and engaged in delinquency.


Dually-Involved Youth

A subgroup of crossover youth who are simultaneously receiving services, at any level, from both the child welfare and juvenile justice systems.

Dually-Adjudicated Youth

A subgroup of dually-involved youth, encompassing only those youth who are concurrently adjudicated by both the child welfare and juvenile justice systems.
